BEARCATS LOSE TO OREGON UNIVERSITY

Throwing its heavy interference against the light Bearcat line for heavy gains, Shy Huntington's Lemon and Yellow machine plowed its way to a 40 to 9 victory over the Willamette Bearcats on Sweetland field yesterday.

Willamette put up one of the scariest battles against overwhelming odds that Sweetland field has ever seen. Never once until the last whistle did the Bearcat warriors cease their strenuous attempt to hold the Lemon plungers. But time after time the Oregon backfield, running with almost perfect interference, plowed between the Willamette ends and tackles for 10 and 30 yard gains with the light Willamette backs unable to halt the heavy attack until yardage had been made.

Willamette was outclassed and outplayed in every quarter of the game but they put up a fight that has made local fans more than pleased with the prospects for the remainder of the season. The Oregon squad played like veterans with team work and interference for their runners that the Bearcats cannot hope to equal before a month of practice.

The first touchdown came within six minutes. Receiving Willamette's kickoff, Sax, Oregon half, returned the ball for 45 yards. Then hammering the Bearcat ends, the visitors in nine downs carried the ball to within three yards of the line from where Terjison carried it in a center line buck for a touchdown. Chapman placed his kick successfully and started the score at 7 to 0.

BAYES KNOCKS OUT PORTLAND FIGHTER

Phil Bayes, Salem's favorite boxer, last night knocked out Billy Leonard of Portland in the second round of a scheduled six-round bout at the armory. The boys weighed 128 and 126 pounds respectively. Leonard's second claimed a foul but referee Charley Yost gave their claims no consideration, and, in the opinion of the spectators, his attitude was justified.

The fight belonged to Bayes from the go-off. He had a wide margin in the first round, and in the second prior to the knockout Leonard took a count of nine and later was sent tumbling through the ropes, which put him in distress.

Other results last night were a decision for Bill Poole of Monroe over Chas. Lindley of Salem, a decision for Duke Mulkey of Monmouth over Earl Snyder of Corvallis, and a draw between Bill Hunt of Salem and "Lone Wolf" McDonald of Portland.

In the Lindley Poole argument the Salem boy accepted a count of nine in the third and again in the fourth round. After he had taken nine in the fourth he got to his feet and pummeled Poole severely, but Lindley apparently was all gone, for between the fourth and fifth his second tossed

McDonald's 170. Hunt lost a patch of plaster off his nose in the first round, opening a wound that distributed blood generously over both parties. In the second Hunt pummeled McDonald's jaw with little retaliation from his opponent. McDonald took a lot of punishment throughout the mill. The sixth and last round was about even. Referee Bill Hunter's draw decision was accepted by the crowd.

Dale Freeman and Benny Dodson of Portland challenged the winner of the Bayes-Leonard go. After the program last night it was stated that Fred Hall, who was knocked out by Eddie Richards of Portland about a year ago, wants a return match with Richards. The card put on last night by Paul Burris, matchmaker for the Salem boxing commission, was a good one that merited a better patronage than that last night.
