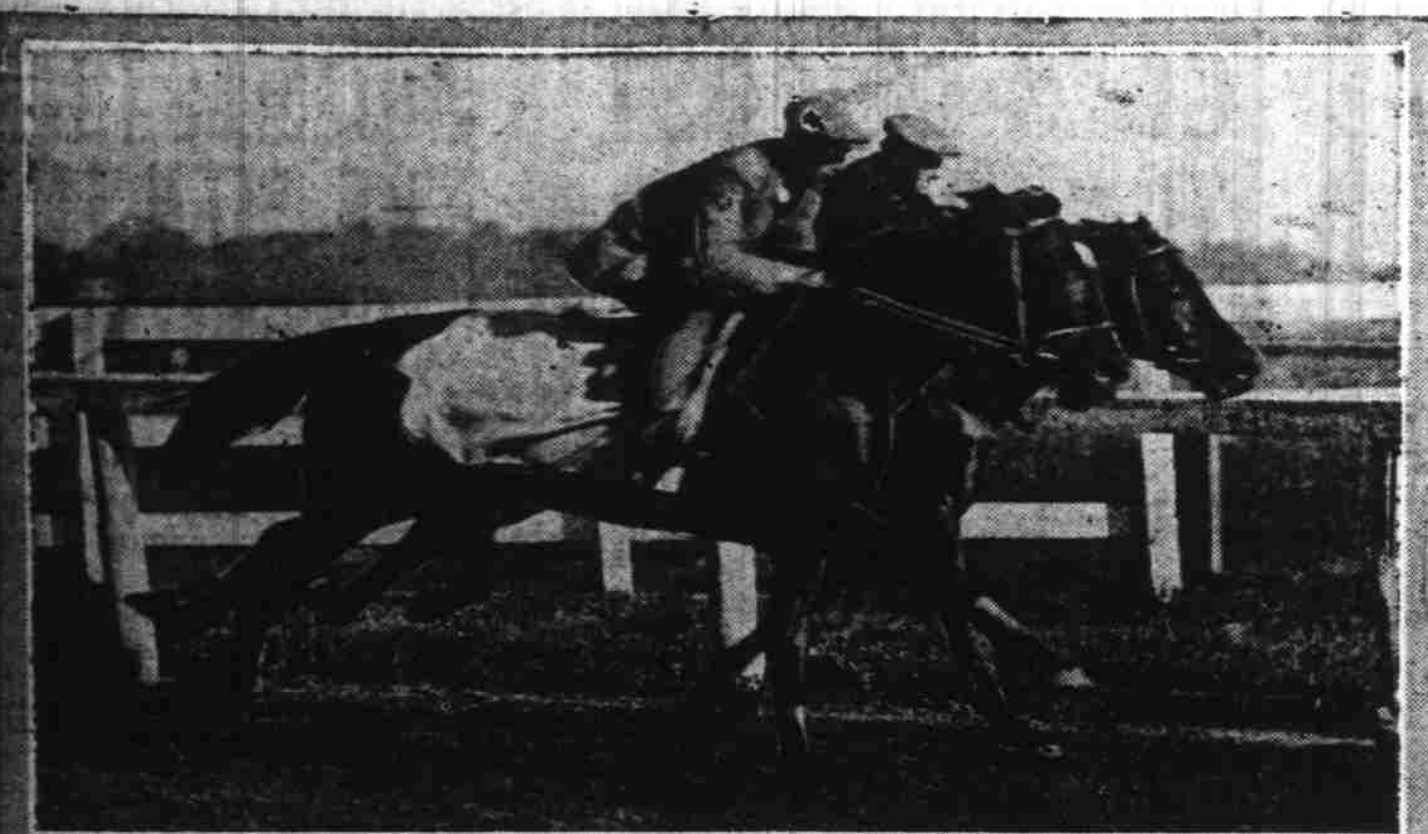

SPORT BRIEFS

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 19.—Gonzaga University football team arrived today for the game with Multnomah Amateur Athletic club tomorrow. Multnomah is keyed up for the fray. Twelve hundred members of the club gathered at the gym last night and yelled themselves hoarse with Wayne Cox, former cheer leader of Oregon Agricultural college who will lead the rooters section of the club tomorrow.

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 19.—Reed college oarsmen are putting in all available time these autumn days rowing on the Willamette river. Alton Lindstrom of Chiloock, Wash., captain of the crew that raced a University of Wash-

ington freshman eight last spring, is captain of the crew this year.

CORVALLIS, Or., Oct. 19.—Stanford university will meet Oregon Agricultural college here tomorrow in the first inter-collegiate polo game to be played on the Pacific coast. Stanford has a strong team, having won from the University of Oklahoma and Arizona this year.

Members of the Aggie team obtained much knowledge and experience in the recent tournament at Vancouver. Horses used by the cavalry team at the Vancouver tournament will be used by the students against the Stanford four. The team will not be handicapped by poor mounts this

year. They have had two years' continual training and are in good trim.

OAC was recently asked to join a western inter-collegiate polo association which is being organized by the Universities of Oklahoma, Arizona, Stanford, Texas, Colorado and Utah.

PASADENA, Cal., Oct. 19.—The Pomona college football team 1922 champions of the southern California conference will take the field tomorrow for the first time this season against the fast eleven from the California Institute of Technology. Pomona will start under a handicap, owing to the temporary absence of McCully, the plunging fullback who has a sprained shoulder and Roland Clark, last year's all-conference back, who is ill with tonsillitis. Caltech is expected to appear with a strong line including Groat, a

forward passer who has been called a second Brick Muller.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 19.—The University of southern California and the University of Washington who meet for the first time in a football game here tomorrow, went through only a light workout today.

Both teams were announced to be in the best of shape and a great battle was expected by Seattle football followers.

The Trojans ventured on the stadium field today for the first time since coming here Tuesday. They had been using a Seattle golf links for practice.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 19.—Coach "Nig" Borleske of the Whitman college football team has been asked by Head Coach Enoch Bagshaw of the University of Washington to sit on the Washington-University of Southern California game here tomorrow.

It is understood the Whitman mentor will offer suggestions on the Husky offensive and defensive growing out of observations during the Whitman-Washington game here last Saturday.

U. OF O. GRIDSTERS WIN WHITMAN GAME

Latham Makes Two of Three Touchdowns Scored in Game at Pendleton

PENDLETON, Ore., Oct. 19.—The University of Oregon gridsters proved too much for little Whitman college here today, defeating them by a 21 to 0 score. The Webfooters scored in every quarter but the third and lost several chances to score by fumbles. Whitman threatened twice in the second and fourth quarters. In the final period after Oregon had made a touchdown on four successive first downs, Whitman opened an aerial attack, completing four passes for a total of 27 yards that with a few runs around end mixed in brought them to the Oregon six-yard line where they were held for downs. The Oregon backfield shone brilliantly throughout, making a total of 252 yards from scrimmage to 85 for Whitman and 17 first downs to four for Whitman.

SALEM HIGH WINS FOOTBALL BATTLE BY 12 TO 0 SCORE

Two sensational runs, one by Gould for 48 yards, and a second by Smith who raced with the ball for nearly three-quarters the length of the field, brought victory to Coach Huntington's red and black Salem high grid warriors by a 12 to 0 score in their clash with Forest Grove high on Sweetland field yesterday.

Gould made the first touch down for the locals in the first quarter when he clamped his hooks around a punt fumble and raced down an almost clear field for a 48-yard run and touchdown. The kick was unsuccessful.

The second score came in the last quarter when Smith, promising new player who entered his first interscholastic football game yesterday, tore through the Forest Grove left end, and ran nearly three-quarters the length of the field before he was downed, eight yards from the line. Keenan carried the ball over the line in the first down from three. Again the goal kick was unsuccessful. The visitors put up a scrap that kept the Salem high men at maximum fighting notch every minute. They used the aerial route successfully six times, but each time failed to get off on a run before one of Huntington's men dropped them. In the third quarter Forest Grove took advantage of a fumbled punt and one of their

players fell on the ball within the 20-yard line, but they were held for four downs, unable to make yardage.

Patterson starred in the backfield for the locals while Emmerson did the best work for the Forest Grove aggregation. On the line, Gould, Coffey, Ausman and Ringle did creditable work for Salem.

Although showing plainly that they were still in first of the season form, Huntington's aggregation showed real promise. Taking into consideration their lack of practice and the quantity of new material, the Salem high squad played excellent football. Slow interference held down their score, but that, with their other weak points, are such as can be easily smoothed over with more practice.

The Forest Grove men showed careful training in their prowess at passing, and with their heavy line are a formidable machine. The visitors made a little more than their share of the fumbles, but excelled the locals in punting and kicking.
