ZEV TAKES MILE
RACE IN 1:40 3-5

Earl Sande Rides Winner of International Race in Championship Stake

NEW YORK, Oct. 31.—Zev today demonstrated that he is fit for the \$50,000 championship at Latonia next Saturday when he will meet My Own in what may prove the deciding three-year-old test of the year by galloping to easy victory in the \$5,000 autumn championship stakes, feature event of the closing day's card at Empire City track.

The race, at a mile for all ages proved little more than a workout for the conqueror of Papyrus. Ridden by Earl Sande and carrying 120 pounds, Zev breezed under the wire in 1:40 3-5, five lengths ahead of Bracdale, a stablemate. Harry Payne Whitney's Tryster was third. Ladkin, the only other starter, finished fourth after breaking away to run three quarters of a mile before the race. Zev was worked an extra furlong by Sande, finishing the mile and an eighth in 1:56 1-5.

The Rancocas star went to the post coupled with Bracdale at odds of 1 to 15 in the betting. Tryster set the pace for the first half mile, after which Zev took command and was never threatened.

Sande, who will ride Zev in the Latonia championship, left for Cincinnati tonight. Zev will be shipped tomorrow to Latonia.

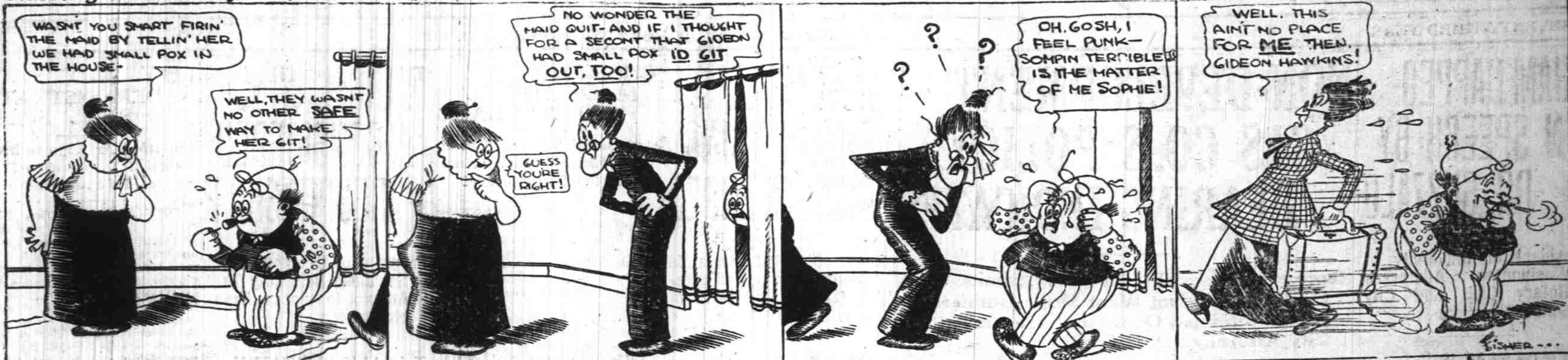

OREGON GRIDSTERS
WILL BATTLE WSC

Huntington's Men Leave Eugene Early This Morning for Pullman

EUGENE, Or., Oct. 31.—The University of Oregon football squad of 20 men accompanied by Coaches Huntington and Spellman and Trainer Hayward, will leave Eugene tomorrow at 7:35 a. m. for Pullman, Wash., where they will play the fast Cougar eleven.

With the exception of Risley, the Oregon squad is in good shape for the clash, the coaches said today. To replace Risley on the line Spellman has two good men. Cog Campbell, a veteran of last year's team, and Kinney, who has not been in school since 1921. Both have been showing up good at practice.

Dick Reed, who has been going good at tackle, will probably be shifted to end in the coming game, and the other wing berth will be taken care of by Williamson.

Either Campbell or Kinney will go in at tackle while Sinclair is again slated for center with Williamson in reserve. Mills who has been suffering with a lame foot, is back at guard with Bailey on the other side. Von Der Ahe, veteran, will be at tackle. In the backfield, Chapman, quarter, Sax and Terjeson, halves and Latham, full, will probably start. Utility men are Poulson, French and Anderson.

The squad will have a light workout in Portland tomorrow afternoon, before going on to Pullman. The men who will make the trip are Wilson and Sinclair, centers, Shields, Bailey, Mills and Bliss, guards; Von Der Ahe, Campbell, tackles, Reed, Mautz, Williamson and Kinney, ends; Chapman, Latham, Sax, Terjeson, French, Anderson and Poulson, backs.

Coach Huntington, as usual, made no predicaments concerning the game but said his men are primed to play the hardest game of the year.

Process to Make Meat
Tender Is Discovered

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—Use of papaya leaves or a powder from the dried fruit of the papaw to make tough meat tender, as is done in southern climates, is not considered desirable by the department of agriculture, whose bureau of home economics has conducted a series of experiments in that line. Leaves crushed and wrapped around meat made it more tender but gave it a decided taste of the green and bitter juice of the leaves.

A solution of the powder applied to cuts of meat gave it a bitter taste, deprived it of its natural meat flavor and caused it to be dry. Leaves grown in the botanical gardens at Washington and others brought from Miami, Fla., were used. They acted the same. Both the leaves and the powder contain an enzyme which digests protein.

LABOR ENDORSES
INCOME TAX LAW

Extension Work of State Educational Institutions Also Receives Approval

ASTORIA, Or., Oct. 31.—Today's session of the state federation of labor convention was harmonious, every decisive action taken being with practically a unanimous vote. Resolutions adopted included those endorsing the state income tax act that is to be voted on next Tuesday; approving the workers educational bureau; endorsing the fire prevention work that is being carried on by the state and civic bodies; commending the extension division work of

the University of Oregon and the Oregon Agricultural college; promoting organization of unions among teachers in the public schools; urging the promotion of world peace by education in the schools along the lines of peace; endorsing the Brookwood labor college and supporting the pressmen's union in Portland in its efforts to secure the establishment of a technical school in that city.

The resolutions committee asked for and was allowed more time to report on three resolutions. They are the ones to endorse the farm labor bureau, to urge a stricter enforcement of the Volstead act and to request the federation to assist in unionizing the various fire departments of the state.
