## SALEM HIGH WINS BY 19-0 SCORE

Cottage Grove Eleven Out-classed by Local Team Here Yesterday

For four full 15 minute periods yesterday afternoon the Salem high school football team kept the visiting Cottage Grove eleven fighting in their own territory, and then trotted back to its ball-wick with the visitors scalps hanging in their belts. The final score was 19 to 0.

Salem kicked off in the opening canto, and for a few minutes it looked as if the locals would have their hands full. Too much enthusiasm cost a five-yard penalty for offside playing, and then they were unable to penetrate the opposing line. But after that there was not much to the game and at no time did the Cottage Grovers threaten or even threaten to threaten. A place kick failing in the first quarter, and the game stood scoreless.

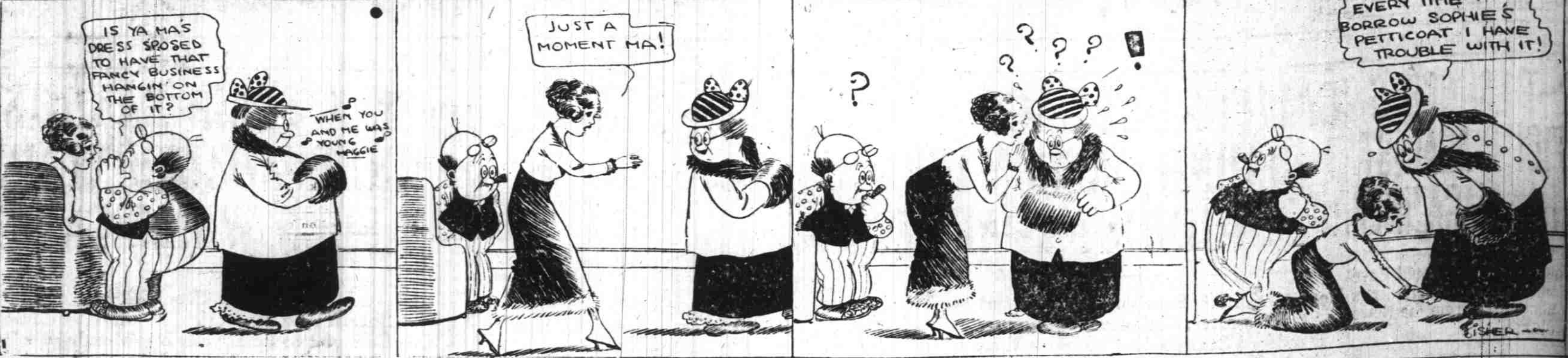
Perhaps the change of goals was responsible, but at any rate Salem picked up and started to play a little football. A punt was blocked by Salem, recovered, and first down made on two-line backs. Ringle hit the line for a touchdown, Patterson converting for the only extra unit of the game. The remaining five minutes of the first half was fast, Salem recovering a double fumble and marching close to the goal when time was called. Score first half Salem 7; Cottage Grove 0. Patterson, with good sized chunks of the opposing line opened by the Salem linemen, went over twice for markers in the remaining two quarters. Converting in both cases failed, leaving the final score 19 to 0 in favor of the red and black.

In the third stanza Salem got its best lick, making four consecutive first downs. A disastrous fumble on the two-yard line in the final quarter lost the locals a possible touchdown.

## IN MEMORIAM WINNER IN RACE

Zev Comes in Second Six Lengths Behind — My Comes in Third

LATONIA, Ky., Nov. 3.—(By the Associated Press).—A Kentucky-bred and owned horse, with a Kentucky boy in the saddle, caused the greatest surprise that has climaxed a turf spectacle in years today when In Memoriam defeated Zev and his greatest American rival, My Own, in the Latonia championship stakes, before a crowd of 45,000 spectators who braved a cold, drizzling rain to witness the startling upset. The victory of the handsome bay, son of McGee-Enthantress, owned by Carl Wiedemann, millionaire horseman of Newport, Ky., was convincing. Sprinting in to the stretch, In Memoriam conquered Zev, the conqueror of Papyrus and winner of the Kentucky derby, raced him into submission and flashed across the wire a winner by at least six lengths. Back of the flashing heels of Zev came Read Admiral Cary T. Grayson's My Own, trailing eight lengths back. Rialto, the fourth starter in the race, was distanced in the stretch and pulled up without even trying to catch the flying leaders. The race at a grueling test of one and three quarters miles was run in 3 minutes and 4-5 seconds, 5-1-5 seconds slower than the American record established by Rockminster in the same race a year ago. By strange coincidence, Jockey Mack Garner, the pride of Kentucky's knights of the saddle, who rode In Memoriam to victory today, holds the distinction of riding Rockminster when that three-year-old made the record. The triumph of In Memoriam was a stunning surprise.

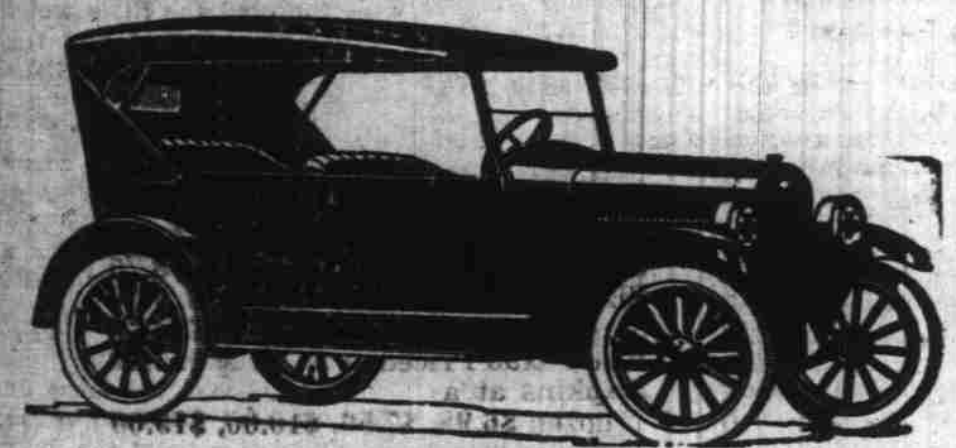
