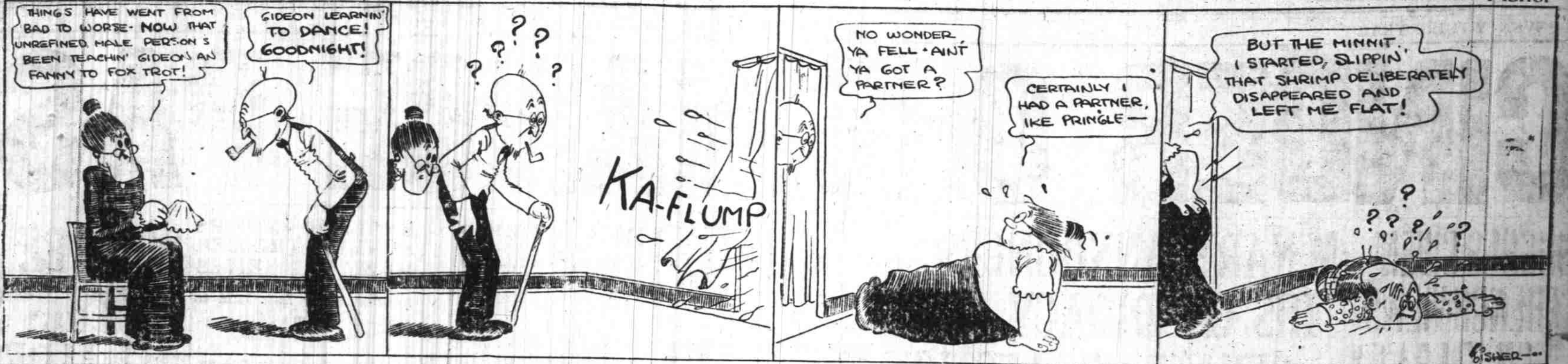

### MULTIPLE LISTING SYSTEM ADOPTED

#### Marion-Polk Realtors Adopt Plan Which Is Thought Means More Service

The multiple listing system was adopted by 16 members of the Marion-Polk Realtors association last night, and it is expected that nearly all of the other members will sign the agreement later. The meeting last night was a hold over from the one held last Thursday. This system is just now being much used among the realtors of the larger cities.  
Henceforward owners of property for sale who will sign an exclusive contract with any member of the multiple listing bureau will receive the selling service of every member. As soon as an exclusive sales contract is signed up it is reported to the central office and duplicate descriptions of the property and terms of sale sent to every cooperating member. The owner pays but one commission which is divided between the listing and selling agents with a small portion to the central bureau.  
Assisting the local realtors at last night's gathering were four members of the Portland realty board, all active supporters of the multiple listing idea.  
The visitors were T. W. Zimmerman, secretary of the Northwest Real Estate association; A. H. Hickman, business manager and member of the board of governors of the Multiple Listing board; Harold Jungck, treasurer and member of board of governors of Multiple Listing board; C. V. Johnson of the Symmonds-Johnson company and former deputy state real estate commissioner.

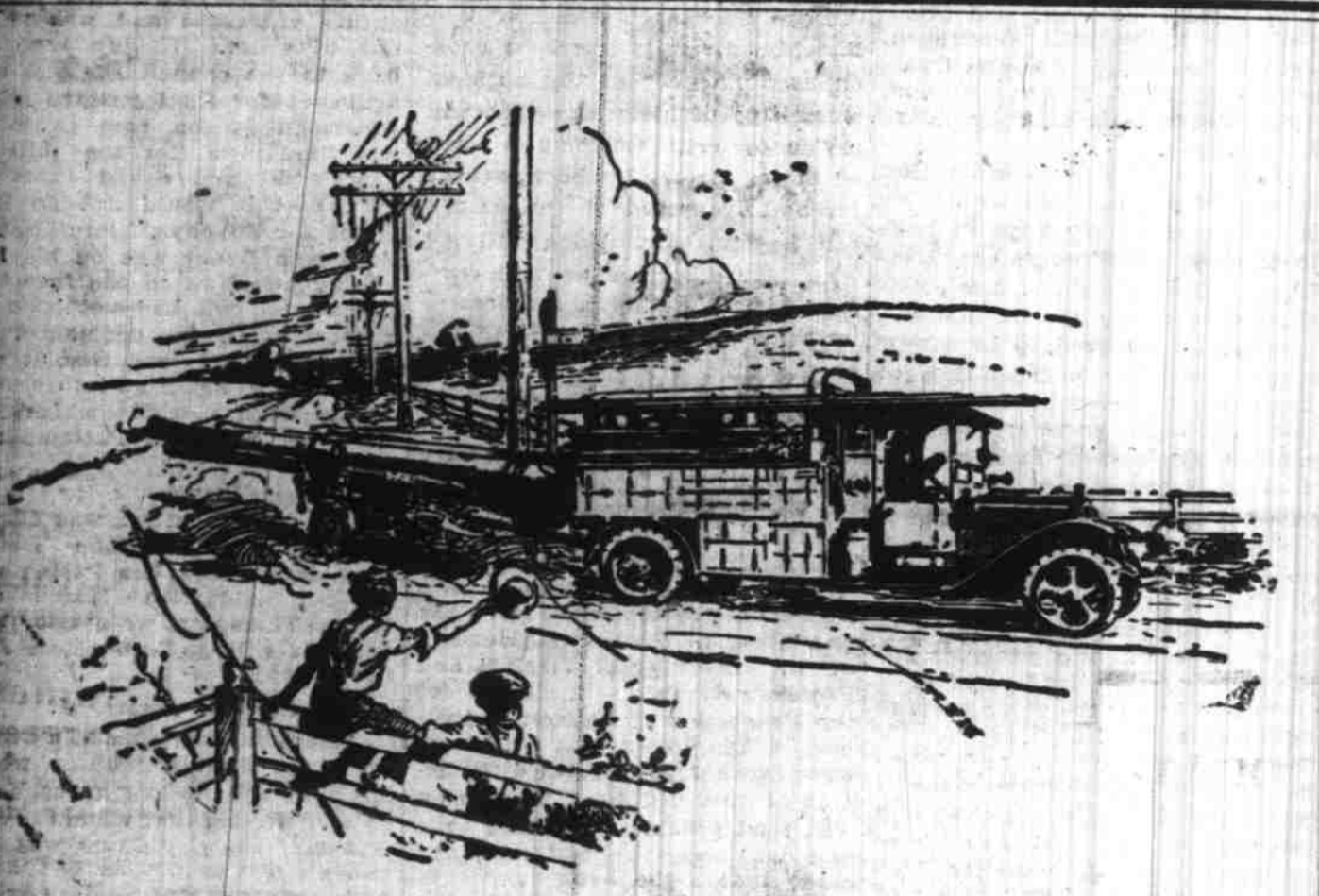

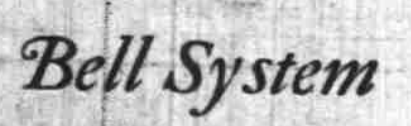
### on committees which is empowered to make up the personnel of the various committees in the senate, and select the chairman thereof.
