

MUSICAL COMEDY
ONE OF GREATEST

Grand Theatre Will Present
Beautiful Stage Favorite
Soon

Musical comedy will hold sway
at the Grand theater Wednesday,
Nov. 23, when dainty "Irene,"
funful and irresistible will be seen
there.

No light opera, in recent years,
has been quite as successful as
has "Irene." Not only did it score
a record run for over two years
in New York City at the Vander-
bilt theater, but it can claim
long engagements in other Ameri-
can cities, the longest in fact and
in foreign capitals, it having been
played all over the world.

Musical comedies that have gone
before "Irene" have had, many of
them, much to recommend them.
Some have been notable for melo-
dies, some for novelty, some for
character drawing, as in the case
of "Bally" a few for plot, and
here and there one for some com-
bination of these merits. It has
remained for "Irene" to encom-
pass all these qualities and to have
marked up to its credit one more-
class. There is class in the story,
class in the musical numbers,
class in the production or staging
and, what is of vital importance,
class in the company.

"Irene" brings back memories
of "The Belle of New York," not
because it is at all like the "Belle"
but because of its type-a-play of
contrast. The story is wove about
a shopgirl who, through a curious
combination of circumstances, is
thrust into fashionable society.
From the drudge of the ribbon
counter she with two girl compan-
ions, finds herself suddenly a
belle in a circle of wealth and so-
cial standing and gets away
with it. Like Julia O'Grady and
the Colonel's lady, the shopgirl
is and the society girls and sisters
under the skin.

The play is in two acts, with
three scenes in the first act, and
four in the second. The action
starts on the veranda of Donald
Marshall's palatial home on Long
Island. Marshall is a young man
of high ideals, a well a man of
millions. From a friend he learns
that a certain Mme. Lucy, a dress-
maker, lately located in New York
from London, has peculiarities
of great success if only some good-
looking girl can be found to wear
the dressmaker's creation in the
fashionable society.

BETTER PRICES
FOR NUTS LOOM

Quality Exceptionally Fine
This Year, Though Yield
Is Trifling Off

With an exceptionally fine crop
of quality walnuts in the district,
though the tonnage will be under
that of last year, when the grow-
ers' association handled 79 tons,
better prices are anticipated this
year.

In general the crop last year
was poor in quality. Because of
this the Oregon market cast a
glorious eye upon local grown nuts
and until the last few weeks paid
little attention to the nuts grown
in the state. The market is show-
ing a better trend at present, owing
to the noticeable increase in
quality this year.

Bulk nuts are being held by the
Oregon Growers here and by the
Wholesale association at 30 cents
for No. 1, 25 cents for No. 2, 20
cents for No. 3 round nuts, and 15 cents
for the third classification.

Apples Almost Given
Away Growers Report

Prices for apples are such as to
virtually give the fruit away, ac-
cording to quotations from the
Oregon Growers association. Ac-
cording to quotations being
received by telegraphic orders
from fancy Spitzenbergs demand
only \$1.25, while the choice boxes
are quoted at \$1.35.

Just what angle the market will
assume is not known, but from
present indications there is little
prospects of better
prices approaching the actual val-
ues of the fruit.

Smith Takes Prizes
With Cattle at Portland

County Commissioner Jim
Smith took second prize on a car-
load of two-year-old Herford
cattle at the Pacific International
stock show this week and the
later brought 9 cents a
pound on the market with top
selling for 7 1/2 cents. Roth-
am Durhams from Spokane
took first and third places with
prizes.

The second prize was \$150, and
Smith took second place last
year, the steers bringing only 5 1/2
cents on the market last year.
He hopes that he will
take first place next
