

EXCHANGE BREAKS SEND WHEAT DOWN

Wet Weather in West That Responsible for Upward Swing of Corn

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—Fresh downturns today in the price of wheat accompanied new breaks in foreign exchange with sterling touching the lowest point this year.

Bears in wheat had an advantage from the fact that sterling showed nearly ten points drop within about one week, a fall equalling 2-1/2 cents a bushel on wheat.

Much of the wheat buying that helped to bring about recoveries in price appeared to be from shorts who were in position to collect profits.

Wet weather prevailing in the west was chiefly responsible for an upward swing in the corn market.

MELLON'S PROPOSAL AFFECTS MARKETS

Large Volume of Buying Orders Follow Secretary's Announcement

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—The upward movement of stock prices which has been under way since October 31, was temporarily halted today by a wave of selling for both accounts apparently based on the belief that the rapidity of the recent advance warranted at least a moderate reaction on technical grounds.

Secretary Mellon's proposal for a reduction of federal income taxes apparently met with favor in the financial community because it brought a large volume of buying orders into the market, giving the opening a strong tone.

POINCARÉ PROPOSES EXPERT COMMITTEE

French Premier Would Have Question of Preparations Investigated

PARIS, Nov. 12.—(By The Associated Press.) Premier Poincaré has decided to propose the creation of a committee of experts to investigate the question of German reparations.

The committee as suggested will be composed of delegates from the powers represented on the reparation commission, its duties would be to establish German's external and internal resources; where the exported German capital lies, and how it can be brought back; how and in what amount the resources of the reich can at present be utilized for reparations, and how Germany can re-establish her financial position.

It is further proposed that a technical expert be added to the committee for each country. The investigation would last two months at least.

In taking up on his own account a plan for a committee of experts, Poincaré was moved by a desire to furnish fresh proof of his resolution to leave no method untried to lead to a solution of the reparations problem.

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Accordingly, M. Poincaré has instructed M. Barthou, president of the reparations commission, to ask that body at tomorrow's sitting to designate this commission of experts. At the same time the commission will have to pass on the German demand to be heard on the reich's financial situation, action on which was postponed on the motion of Sir John Bradbury until the outcome of the negotiations with the United States became known.

It is expected that the commission will decide on this point tomorrow and that a hearing will take place in Paris as soon as the reich sends representatives.

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MOVIE GOSSIP

Then there is the strange pyrochroite, which in the mine is sky blue and transparent, but when brought to the surface turns dark brown and opaque. Another similar metal changes in the same way from a beautiful green to black. Another, when heated, turns into thin sheets that resemble gold leaf.

PARIS, Nov. 12.—(By The Associated Press.)—After four months recess, the chamber of deputies will reconvene tomorrow. The Poincaré cabinet will be faced with some forty interpellations dealing with foreign and internal policies.

Although no official announcement has been made to that effect, those close to the premier say he will raise the question of confidence immediately, refusing to discuss any interpellations before dealing with internal or foreign affairs, and request that such matters be postponed indefinitely. The government will contend that in the face of the present troubled and unsettled situation, the unsolved problems of reparations and inter-allied military control in Germany, this is no time for discussion.
