Locating Albany Bridge

ALBANY, Nov. 12.—The location of the proposed Albany bridge is becoming the issue today among Albany business men who are speculating on what part Albany should have in locating the bridge. It was suggested that a committee be appointed from among the business and professional men who have taken an active part in putting over the bond issue, to confer with the state bridge engineers in selecting the location.

It is pointed out that if Albany taxpayers are to pay one-eighth of the taxes of the county to build the bridge and an additional bonus of one-fourth or \$35,000 the local tax payers should be considered. Various opinions are being expressed as to the best place to serve the highest interests of the town. The consensus of opinion is that no fight should be stirred up on the location question, but at the same time the location should not be allowed to drift without due consideration.

BIG GRANGE MEETING

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Nov. 12.—The Rogue River Valley Grange Friday night held one of the most successful sessions that the grange has ever given. About 200 people were fed at the cafeteria dinner and afterwards a program was given by the boys and girls of the grange. The entire audience was well pleased with the program and say that the young people deserve much commendation for the manner in which they gave the two playlets.

Big Crop of Turkeys

ROSEBURG, Nov. 12.—With the approach of the Thanksgiving season, thoughts naturally turn to the fowl which since the founding of the day, has been associated with the holiday. In Douglas county, the turkey center of Oregon, the market for the birds is a matter of supreme importance, and right now the growers are endeavoring to obtain every possible bit of information on prospective market conditions and are striving to learn what may be expected in the nature of a price on the fowls.

All information obtainable at the present time points to a price of 35 to 37 cents per pound for the Thanksgiving turkey. It appears to be the general opinion of the local turkey buyers, and the prominent growers, who have been investigating market conditions, that the price will hold fairly steady at about that figure. Possibly it may not go above 35 cents, and, on the other hand, if the demand is as good as is expected, the price may be boosted a couple of cents. In all events the Umpqua valley turkeys, which have achieved a world-wide reputation, will bring the highest market price.

October Breaks Record

MARSHFIELD, Nov. 12.—The five ships which sailed from Coos Bay during the month of October bearing cargoes for foreign ports carried 11,832,900 feet of lumber the second largest monthly shipment ever to leave the bay, according to the records of Chester Clark, port customs officer.

The largest monthly export was that of September, when eight

mainder being held by unorganized growers not under control. These figures represent the new crop only, as it is estimated that an additional 3,000,000 pounds of the old crop has not yet been disposed by the growers.

Figuring all fruit in the houses and driers, indications are that the Oregon Growers will handle approximately 15,000,000. The total pounds of prunes handled by all northwest associations in addition is 25,250,000, with the Washington Growers handling about 7,000,000 pounds. The remainder is divided among the smaller associations.

Estimates of between 40,000,000 and 45,000,000 pounds for the northwest, including 2,000,000 pounds in Idaho, are believed to hold true.

Lane County Gets New Roads

EUGENE, Nov. 12.—In compliance with an order of the county court the county surveyor's force will survey three new county roads this coming week.

One, to be surveyed on November 13, is up Spencer creek to replace the present road to H. Chesen's place.

On November 14 the Rust road west of Barclay, will be surveyed. This will open up a small valley. The following day a road will

be surveyed between Siltcoos and Ada stations on the Coos Bay branch line of the Southern Pacific, where there is no road at present, says County Engineer Morse.
