Lane County Claims the Credit. EUGENE, Nov. 12.—Lane county refuses to sit modestly back and let credit for the income tax

victory go to any other section of the state.

Sentiment here today seemed to be one of pride in adding the finishing touch, the grand climax to this battle for more equalized distribution of the tax burden, and, as some would have it, test of Governor Pierce's hold on the electorate.

Reason? Reason enough, say these who fought most heartily for the success of the measure: A four to one vote is more than staunchest adherents had the right to expect, they point out.
