At the general meeting of the Salem Arts League Wednesday evening in the city library, three new sections were added to carry on the work of the year. Musical composition and etching sections were formed, the work of which will be conducted by Dr. John R. Sites. Mrs. Gertrude Robinson Ross will direct the Shakespeare

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section and the new interior decorating section will be under the leadership of Mrs. Monroe Gilbert. The classes conducted by the leaders of the sections are free to anyone in the city who is interested enough in the work to make a further study of it. Admission to the sections should be made through the various leaders. Stereoptican slides of a number of autochromes made by Robert Paulus, president of the league, took up the first part of the meeting. Although not a professional photographer Mr. Paulus is claimed to be the owner of one of the finest collections of autochromes in the west. His pictures included scenes of Crater Lake, flowers, fruits, landscapes, ablaze with the autumnal colorings, and scenes from the Patterson orchards near Salem. While the pictures were being shown Mr. Paulus spoke concerning the pictures and the methods used in making them.

Mrs. J. C. Nelson displayed samples of some hand made laces and embroideries which has recently been sent to her from Vienna to be sold for the benefit of the impoverished gentility of Germany. Papers were read during the evening in which were expressed the individual ideas of just what the line of endeavor for the league should be and how it should be carried out. From the papers read it seems to be the ideal of the league to promote good taste and the love of the beautiful, and in the work it is hoped that no duplication of the other art clubs of the city will be effected.

Mrs. Monroe Gilbert discussed the possibility of obtaining the art craft exhibit which is now on display at the arts and crafts museum of Portland, for the month of December. There is an exhibit of 30 paintings by three of the best known contemporary artists which is now on the coast. If this exhibit comes to Portland it will be possible for the league to bring it to Salem sometime during the first of the year. The exhibit includes work by rederick Waugh, the marine artist, Daniel Garber, the painter of delicate landscapes, and Jonas Lie who is noted for his bold color work.

The main difficulty confronting the league in bringing such exhibits to Salem is the finding of a suitable place for display.

Membership in the league is open to anyone who is interested in seeing good taste improved and the love of the beautiful more universally encouraged among the citizens of the city.

prices. The nuts are quoted at from 15 cents to 40 cents a pound, depending upon the grade.
Bosc pears are selling at 20 and 25 cents a box. These are of the winter variety and will ripen in a few weeks.

California lettuce is beginning to replace the home-grown variety and is quoted at 15 cents a head. Fall cabbage is selling at 2 1/2 and 3 cents a pound.
There are no changes in the dairy product or poultry departments of the markets.
