parking privileges ought to be such as to accommodate patrons from the country—from a wide territory. Salem depends very largely for its prosperity upon the good will of the people of a big district. They should all but own the city, while they are the guests of Salem. If they need two hours instead of one, let them have two hours. Even forget the parking ordinance, if it is going to militate against outside trade.

Salem ought to have the newest proposed paper mill, which is to be built outside the city limits of Portland. But those who are promoting it say it could not be built close to the business or residence center. It is to be the kind of a paper mill that will smell to heaven; a sulphate mill, not a sulphide mill, like the one in Salem. Sulphide is attar of roses compared with sulphate. Salem ought to have several more paper mills, including a news print mill, for which there are vast supplies of raw materials available. But a news print mill would take a great deal of power for the grinding of the pulp. Even the Oregon City mills have to shut down some of their grinders when the water is low in the Willamette river in the dry season. There is ample power, how-

ever, in the Santiam section, that ought to be developed for this and other purposes.
