HUSKIES TO FACE
OREGON IN SEATTLE

Much Trouble Given Northern Team by Webfooters in Past Years

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 30.—When the University of Washington and the University of Oregon football eleven clash here tomorrow in the last Pacific coast championship game of the season the Huskies will face a team that has given them more trouble in past years than any other in the northwest. On the outcome of this game hinges Washington's clear title to the northwest conference championship and its title to second place in the Pacific Coast championship.

Outside of victories that Coach Doble's team registered against the Webfooters between 1908 and 1914 Washington has been able to win but one game in seven played. The Oregonians scored 144 points to 49 for the Huskies in these seven contests.

Washington's last victory over Oregon was obtained here nine years ago. Since then games have either been lost or tied.

The Oregon squad arrived here today and went through a light practice at the stadium. With the exception of Jens Terjeson, halfback who was hurt in the Oregon Aggie game Saturday, Coach Shy Huntington will have his team at virtually full strength. Terjeson was considered one of the main stays of the backfield and will be badly missed. His position will be taken care of by either Anderson or Kirtley, two capable halfbacks.

Washington will be without the services of Ed Kuhn, who was badly hurt in the Washington State game here Saturday. In his place will be Walden Ericson or Abe Wilson, brother of George Wilson, star halfback on the squad.

RICHES MEASURED
BY APPRECIATION

Rev. Long Tells Lions Club That Dollars and Cents Not True Measure

"True riches are measured by appreciation and not by dollars and cents," declared Rev. Ward Willis Long in speaking to the Salem Lions club Friday noon on the subject of "Thanksgiving." There are many things that we value in excess to silver or gold," he said. "Some of these are held dearer than life itself, such as love of country, flag and fellowman."

"Love is one of the many things that cannot be measured," the speaker continued. "For love's sake we are willing to sacrifice everything, love for our fellowman, for an organization, nation and God. Millions have died rather than surrender the righteousness of their hearts."

"Thanksgiving always implies gratitude upon the part of the giver and recipient. It is childish to receive good things and then forget from whence they came. It is a wonderful thing to stop and take an occasional invoice of the moral, spiritual and physical things which we receive. Gratitude takes men out of themselves and makes the world a better place in which to live. Gratitude softens us toward others."

Self-pity was decried by the speaker, who characterized it as a disease. The more troubles a man talks about the more he will have, the speaker said. Conditions of the commercial world were held governed by the psychology of nations. Statistics quoted showed that each individual owed 98 per cent to some one else and only 2 per cent to his own personal efforts, no matter what his status in the world.

tude of the Washington government in that connection could be determined only when the nature of the commission's plan was made known in detail.

The American government itself it was pointed out, would not participate in any event and it was added that no American citizen of a standing that would give his connection with the inquiry any weight would accept membership of the expert committee. It knew that his government objected.

It was said that no definite word as to the reparation plan had been received in Washington. If, however, the restrictions outlined by Premier Poincare to the previous inquiry proposal which was advanced by Great Britain only to fail because of the limited scope demanded by the French premier are to bind the study now proposed by the reparation commission, there is no reason to suppose the American government would be any more ready to sanction the membership of American citizens that it was before.

Conferences Today
Senate Republicans will hold their party conference tomorrow for the selection of a leader and a whip. Senator Lodge has stated that since the senate is already organized, the question of reorganization will not come before the senate.

House Republicans will meet tomorrow and will elect a leader and will nominate Speaker Gillette. The conference will determine the ratio of Democrats to Republicans on house committees and will approve the makeup of the committee which will determine Republican committee assignments.

At a caucus tomorrow night house Democrats will formally determine to support Representative Garrett of Tennessee for speaker, and will elect Democratic members of the ways and means committee, who in turn will select Democratic members of other committees.

Senate Democrats will hold organization conference Monday immediately before congress convenes.

Harris Confirms Holsinger
Miss Holsinger said last night that she considered the statement of Mr. Harris, printed in the evening paper as confirmation of her claims that Willamette chapter was dead when volunteer workers could not be found to canvass for the roll call.

"The roll call for 1924 ended Thanksgiving morning," said Miss Holsinger. "Yet Mr. Meyers says that I hindered the local roll call because of my statements. He said one man was going to give \$20 and now would not do so. I think that man has sense to keep his money."

Mr. Harris, who was in charge of the recent roll call, said that failing to get voluntary helpers by asking the ministers of the various churches, he appealed to the university students, high school students and Boy Scouts. He said the Boy Scouts participated only as individuals because they were prohibited from doing so as an organization. Three women voluntarily offered their services.

One Willamette university student said she wanted the money, and was one of the best workers.

He said \$800 was taken in this year and that \$45 had been paid in commissions, which he considered a good investment. He admitted boys were more easily turned away by those solicited, but that he did not consider it fair to ask adults to work when they had their own work to do.
