Mrs. John T. Luckler, well known Salem woman, who has been in ill health for some time, left her home early Thursday morning in a fit of despondency and drowned herself in Mill Creek, which is not far from the family home on North Church street.

Mrs. Luckler, who was 60 years old, recently returned to Salem from a Portland hospital. She was last seen at 2 o'clock Saturday morning when Mr. Luckler returned home and saw her in bed in her room. He retired for the night and Mrs. Luckler was not missed until 8 o'clock yesterday morning when some one went to call her to breakfast.

Mrs. Luckler is survived by her widower, John T. Luckler, bookkeeper at the Steusloff market, two children, John T. Jr. and Edna W., a sister, Mrs. Minnie Matthies of Buffalo, N. Y. and two brothers, F. W. and W. H. Steusloff of Salem.

It is not too much to say that the stricken family and relatives have the universal sympathy of the people of Salem in their sad loss. The deceased enjoyed the friendship of a wide circle of friends here, who esteemed her for her fine qualities of quiet and womanly and neighborly virtues.
