Frank Saxon of Montreal, light heavyweight champion wrestler of Canada and former champion of Great Britain is coming to the coast the latter part of this month. He intends to wrestle the best light-heavyweights hereabouts and pave his way to a match with Thye for the light heavyweight title of the world and a substantial side bet.

Saxon is considered one of the fastest and cleverest men in the mat game. He is considered the foremost instructor in the art of wrestling in Canada. He does not specialize in any one hold like Thye and some others but is a master of them all from head to toe both in applying and breaking.

He has beaten all the men at his weight whom he has met in Canada and the eastern states so is looking to the Pacific coast for conquest. Included among his vanquished are Maupas the Parisian champion, Lindfors, champion of Sweden, de Longchamps, Christie the Greek, Choquette and Joe Bell the noted Indian grappler. He is confident he can add Ted Thye's name to this list.

If there are any light heavy-weight wrestlers around Salem, Saxon wants to meet them on the mat.
