Harding Memorial Drive
Deferred to January 15
PORTLAND, Or., Dec. 15.—Postponement of the Oregon campaign to raise \$50,000 toward the Harding memorials—mausoleum, shrine and university chair of diplomacy—was unanimously decided upon at the mass meeting of admirers of the late president held in Judge Evans' chambers, courthouse, Wednesday. Mayor Baker introduced the resolution, which gave as reasons the fact that the community chest campaign had not yet closed; that the holiday season was too near at hand and that many merchants and business men were balancing their books. The date set for the opening was January 15. In the meantime, however, C. M. Idlemann, chairman of the county memorial association, will proceed with organization of his forces. The principal speakers last night were B. F. Mulkey, state chairman of the memorial committee; C. M. Idlemann and Mayor Baker. A resolution was adopted deploring the death of ex-Representative C. N. McArthur.
