Editor Statesman: One of the last editorials of a certain Salem paper, "Tax Reduction," puts the writer in mind of what is going on at Silverton about a union high school they're trying to organize.

The writer is chairman of the Victor Point school district, about eight miles south of Silverton and 15 miles east of Salem. Silver Cliff is another district joining ours. We have four scholars going to the Silverton high school. The valuation of our two districts is \$155,138. Our high school tuition is \$468. The Silverton school board is working on a plan that would raise our tuition to \$336. The average cost per scholar in Marion county is about \$113. The valuation of 23 districts that they are figuring on taking in is \$3,788,623. We have

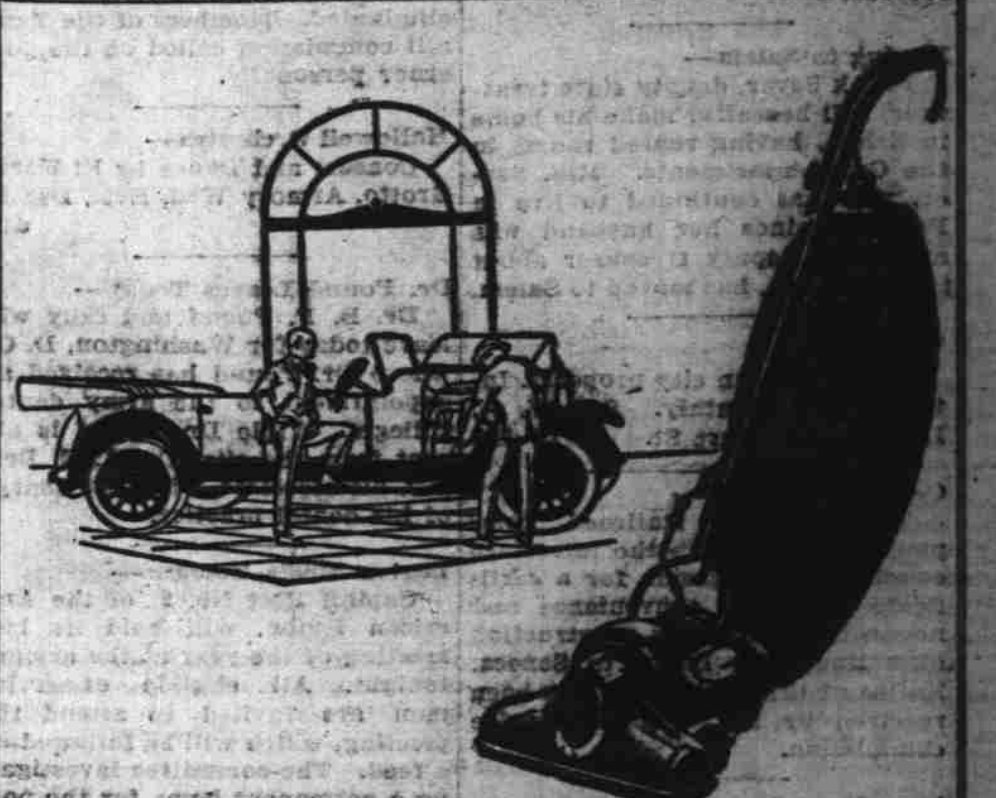
