VICK BROS. SHOW DRAWS THROUGHS

Popularity of Enclosed Models Demonstrated at Auto Exposition

Popularity of enclosed models was demonstrated by the large crowds that attended the Vick Brothers automobile show during the last two days, with the largest crowd Wednesday night when the exhibition closed. It was estimated last night that approximately 2800 people visited the show rooms during the course of the show. Special music was furnished both nights. The Schubert Octette on Tuesday and Siles' orchestra on Wednesday night.

Not only were the rooms beautifully decorated with seasonal plants and foliage, but there were polite salesmen to answer even the most absurd questions about automobiles. A special space was reserved for the women where they could sit and talk while the men discussed the various merits of the automobiles.

TO DISPOSE OF POOL OF BERRIES

Carload of Frozen Logans Held in Portland Will Be Sent to Market

Disposal of the carload of frozen loganberries now being held in storage in Portland by the loganberry pool will be at the discretion of a committee appointed immediately after the meeting of loganberry growers at the Chamber of Commerce auditorium yesterday afternoon. The committee consists of A. M. Chapman, of the Loganberry Exchange; J. C. Perry, president of the Chamber of Commerce and H. H. Haynes, of Portland, president of the Haynes-Poster and Salem Baking companies.

According to a report made by Mr. Haynes, he had received an offer of 6 cents a pound for the berries, f. o. b. Portland, but did not close the deal until he had an opportunity to discuss the situation with others at the pool. The committee was empowered to act as it saw best.

Mr. Haynes, who recently spent three months studying the situation in the east, told of his findings and suggested what had best be done by the growers in the future. His talk was similar to that

given before the Chamber of Commerce at the Monday luncheon. In order that more growers might hear his message, Mr. Haynes made a special trip to Salem Thursday to meet with the berry men.

The auditorium was nearly filled with growers and others interested in the financial development of the loganberry growers.

PRUNE CARTONS GOING RAPIDLY

More Than 2500 Sent Out By Association—Popularity Increasing

More than 2500 cartons of prunes have been sold from the Oregon Growers association plants and a similar amount reported as having been sent to every part of the country through the Portland Chamber of Commerce. With grocery stores and other fruit associations placing many orders, it is believed that at least 2000 cartons of the 1923 pack have been disposed of.

Tonnage, as represented by the prunes, is very light and is not expected to be more than 20 tons. But the packers and growers are very enthusiastic over the response to the prune week movement and the amount of advertising that is being received. Once a taste is established for the prunes, the market is assured.

Not only have prunes been shipped to practically every state in the union, but South America and European points have been the destination of some of the gift boxes. Prune week officially closed December 17, but local packers report many orders received after that time and are still filling orders.
