7,000 RIFLES SOLD OREGON

Weeks Announces Sale of Enfields and Ammunition to Mexican Nation

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—Sale of 7,000 Enfield rifles, 5,000,000 rounds of ammunition, for the guns and eight DH-4 surplus airplanes to the Mexican government was announced today by Secretary Weeks.

The transaction was completed during the day when word came by wire to Mexican agents that the Mexican government had transferred funds necessary to make one-half of the payment in cash, the balance to be paid within 30 days. The terms fixed by Secretary Weeks were equivalent to a cash transaction and were accepted by the Mexican government, paving the way for immediate delivery of the war munitions at the army depots where they are stored.

BOATS ARE USED BY PARIS FOLK

Rise in Flood Waters of Seine Move More Slowly But Water Spread Out

PARIS, Jan. 4.—(By the Associated Press)—The rise in the flood waters of the Seine was slower today than yesterday but the level reached during the night was sufficient to cover large areas of new territory. This compelled thousands of additional people to take safety in boats or to rely on boat service for supplies.

Many of the big apartment buildings in large towns just west of the city, such as Asnières, Colombes and Argenteuil, have been cut off. The authorities found it impossible to get all the inhabitants out of the buildings so a sort of omnibus skiff service was organized to take housewives to the markets and business men to their trains. The number of people driven from their homes increased during the day by several thousand. A large number of these were removed from Alfortville, where a majority of the houses have become uninhabitable, and from along the Marne, where more than 4,000 buildings are surrounded by water. The damage done by the water inside Paris is confined to the district of Auteuil, where a number of streets have been invaded and cellars filled and to the sections in the neighborhood of the chamber of deputies and the Invalides Palace where the Seine
