New Law Supersedes.—Dr. Frederick D. Stricker of Portland, secretary of the state board of health and state health officer, wrote Attorney General Van Winkle asking when the terms of office and for present county and city health officers who were appointed for indefinite periods come to an end in the light of an act of the 1923 legislature limiting the terms of these offices to two years.
