## CALL FUNDS FALL ON STOCK MARKET

### Abundance of Cheap Money Brings Call Money Lowest Since September

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—Encouraged by the decision of the house Republicans to take early action on the tax reduction bill, professional operators resumed their campaign for higher prices in today's stock market, the fifth consecutive million share session. Industrial regained leadership of

the upward movement. Heavy profit taking took place in the railroad shares, particularly the low priced issues, on the circulation of reports that Senator Smith, newly elected chairman of the senate committee on interstate commerce, favored prompt action to lower freight rates, particularly on agriculture.

An abundance of cheap money, which resulted in call funds falling below 4 per cent for the first time since last September, also aided operators for the rise. Time money and commercial paper were quoted at 4 1/2 to 5 per cent.

Food, chemical, merchandising, oil, motor and motor accessory issues gave the best demonstrations of group strength. Steel shares moved within narrow and irregular limits. United States Steel, common again crossed par but fell back later to 99 1/2, where it was up 1/4 on the day. Considerable interest was aroused by the report that floating supply of this stock in brokers' hands on December 21 was 1,048,318

shares, or 20.62 per cent. a new low record. At the end of 1923 the total stock held by brokers was 1,235,864 shares or 26.28 per cent of the amount outstanding.

A temporary bar of strength in the equipment group sent Baldwin up to 137 1/2, but it slipped back later to 125 1/2 for a small fractional gain on the day. General Electric duplicated its record price of 200 1/2, closing slightly below that figure for a net gain of 2 1/2. Oil shares continued to reflect the improvement in that industry, as indicated by a steady reduction in crude output and higher commodity prices.

Sporadic attempts were made during the day by the short interests to unsettle the list by offering stocks freely on the theory that the condition of the market warranted at least a technical reaction. But they failed to make much headway except in a few issues like American Woolen, Tobacco products, Iron products and American Sumatra Tobacco, all of which declined a point or so.

Net losses in the railroad group were, as a rule, limited to fractions. Establishment of another new low record by French francs at 4.77 cents was the feature of the foreign exchange market. Demand sterling eased about 1/2 cent to \$4.27 1/2. Sharp recessions took place in the far eastern rates in reflection of the further drop in silver prices in the local and London markets.

## DROP EXPECTED IN EGG PRICE

### Continuation of Favorable Weather Likely to Affect the Market

Eggs are 40 cents a dozen just now but a drop is expected within a short time if the weather continues favorable. Oranges which were somewhat scarce for a time following the big freeze in the citrus fruit belt are just now more plentiful and range in price from

20 to 30 cents a dozen. Apples are of good quality and the varieties available include Jonathan, Spitzenberg, Wagner and Rome Beauties and the price ranges from \$1 to \$1.75 a box. Lemons are selling at 30 cents a dozen.

Greens are available in splendid quality just now. The mustard green is selling at 10 cents a pound and spinach at two pounds for 25 cents. Brussel sprouts are 20 cents a pound and cauliflower 15 cents a head. Home grown beets are retailing at 4 cents a pound, and are of good quality.

The winter vegetables available include turnips which retail at 4 cents a pound, squash, 3 cents; pumpkins at 10 cents apiece; and parsnips at 4 cents a pound; carrots 3 cents and sweet potatoes, 2 pounds for 25 cents.

For the salads the housewife finds the lettuce is good for this time of the year and ranges in price from 10 to 15 cents a head. The celery is of good quality and fairly plentiful.

July \$1.07 5-5. Corn closed to 1-4 lower, oats varying from a shade decline to 1-4 cent advance, and provisions at 12@15 cents off to 5 cents gain.

With Liverpool wheat quotations sharply higher today, the fact was emphasized that the Liverpool market had gained at a rapid rate on the Chicago market since the beginning of the new year, about 3 cents a bushel, and that the value of United States wheat was close to a world parity. Besides wheat receipts in this country was so small as to arouse comment that more or less melting away of the domestic visible supply total would be shown on Monday whereas world reports for the week promised to be fully 1,000,000 bushels in excess or the previous week. However, the action of the corn market, although at first a source of strength to wheat, became later a bearish influence.

Profit taking on the part of holders of wheat ensued and almost wiped out the early gains. Corn averaged lower in price, after a firm start. Better weather conditions led to some speculative selling, and tended to slow down demand as compared with preceding days. It was said also that county offerings, though still restricted, were a little more liberal than of late. On the other hand, it was disclosed that 800,000 bushels had been taken for shipment from gulf ports to northern Europe. Oats were upheld by improved shipping demand.

Notwithstanding higher prices on hogs, provisions were easier in sympathy with corn.
