DIXMUDE'S FIRST PILOT



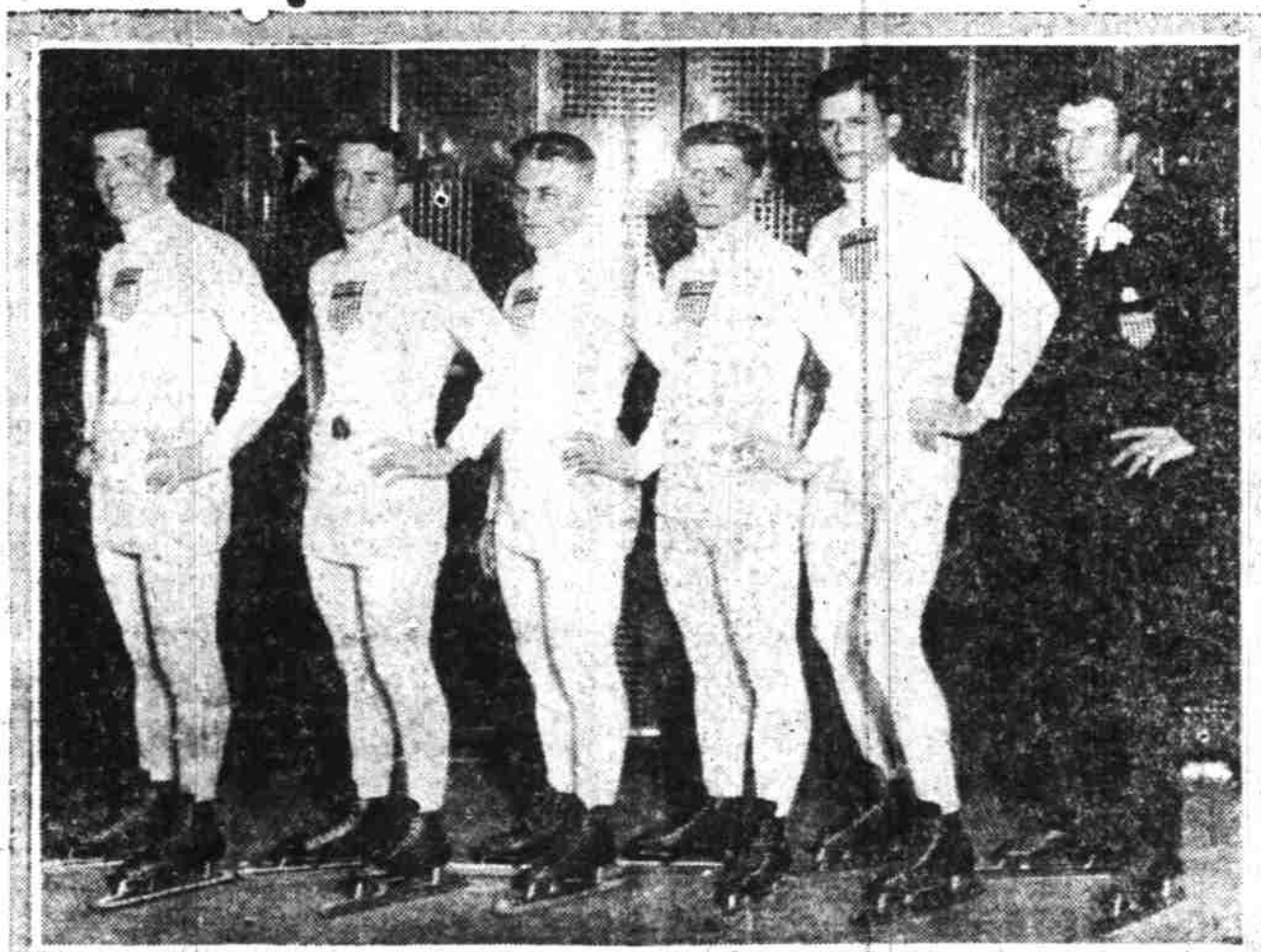
