PROF. C. I. LEWIS
DIES IN CHICAGOHe Was Organizer of the
Oregon Growers and One
of County's Big Men

Word of the death of Prof. C. I. Lewis, managing editor of the American Fruit Grower Magazine of Chicago for the past two years, was received at the offices of the Oregon Growers Cooperative association yesterday. The death

occurred yesterday morning at the home at 525 Home avenue, Oak Park, Ill., a suburb of Chicago. Professor Lewis had undergone an operation for a cancerous condition in his stomach. He had recovered somewhat and resumed his work, and hopes were enter-

tained of complete recovery, until a few weeks ago.

Mrs. Lewis and five children, three boys and two girls, survive him. The Lewis family resided in Salem, on North Capitol street, for some years, before removal to Chicago.

Professor Lewis was born in Cardiff, Wales, April 12, 1880, coming to this country an orphan in his youth. He was graduated from the Massachusetts Agricultural college, Amherst, Boston university and received his MSA degree from Cornell.

For 14 years Professor Lewis was chief of the division of horticulture of Oregon Agricultural college, resigning from the institution after he had become interested in the organization of a cooperative sales agency to handle the products of fruit growers in Oregon. After his resignation he became assistant general manager of the Oregon Growers, which place he held until leaving for the east to assume the responsibilities of publishing the fruit trade journal.

Big Man in Fruit World
Professor Lewis was a big man in the fruit world; one of the greatest in America. He was the writer of more than 50 bulletins on orchard subjects. He was the author of a text book for schools on pear growing.

He was one of the best known men in his line throughout the Pacific coast, and all over the United States.

It is understood here that he carried large life insurance policies. Mrs. Lewis was in her girlhood Marie A. Berry, of New Paltz, N. Y.
