Eggs which were expected to take a big drop in price have disappointed those who buy them by not only remaining at the usual high price but in addition being hard to get at any price. It is not expected that this condition will prevail to any great extent.

This bunch beets with greens are available and are popular with those buying in the markets. The usual run of winter vegetables is available but considerable preference is being shown just now for the early vegetables which are just a bit ahead of time.

The lettuce is good and is available in fairly good quality. Spinach is coming in just now in good quality.

SETBACK SUFFERED IN GRAIN MARKET

Assertion That Farmers Will Sell Corn Affects Buying Prices

CHICAGO, Jan. 18. — Wheat, corn and oats, all underwent a setback in price today, affected a good deal by assertions that the farmers were more inclined to sell their corn than has recently been the case. Corn closed heavy, 3-8 @ 78¢ to 7-8¢ lower; May, 78 3/4¢ @ 78 3/4¢ to 7-8¢, with wheat weak at 1/4 to 3/4 @ 7-8¢ decline; May, \$1.08 3/4 to \$1.08 3/8, and July, \$1.06 7-8. Oats was 1-8 @ 3/4¢ off and provisions unchanged, 10 @ 12 cents down.

Reports that country offerings of corn were freer had a bearish influence from the outset in the corn market, and were supplemented by gossip that shippers here were buying back corn from the east in settlement. Whatever

loosening up there may have been on the part of rural holders of corn, though, the bulk of the grain thus obtained was for outside markets, such as Omaha, very little appearing to have been bought from Chicago. However, general demand for corn was apparently without the aggressive character which has recently been in evidence and considerable selling here resulted from talk of expected larger receipts next week. Declines in the value of wheat were due to reported large wheat shipments from Argentina and Australia, as well as to sympathy with the corn market and to industrial unrest. Although indications pointed to a reduction Monday in the United States visible wheat supply total, wheat, like corn, closed at virtually the day's bottom figures. Reports of more snow covering for winter wheat were an offset for predictions of sub-zero weather.

Oats were depressed by a further selling on the part of elevators. Breaks in the price of hogs pulled down provisions.

MARKET PRICES TAKE EVEN COURSE

Selling Relatively Quiet—Bears Renew Activities on Corn Products

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—Stock prices pursued an even course in today's relatively quiet market, fluctuations being of a narrow character. Bear traders renewed their attacks on such speculative favorites as Baldwin, American Can and Studebaker, but they encountered strong support just below yesterday's closing levels and met with little success.

Some of today's selling is reported to have been inspired by the market letters of some of the larger commission houses predicting that the market was entering a trading area, pending more definite indications of the trend of spring business and urging a reduction of long commitments in some of the issues which have registered sharp gains in the last two months. Professional traders, wintering in Florida also were reported to be heavy sellers of stocks in the last few days. Spec-

cial strength developed, however, in various sections of the list.

A bullish demonstration in Corn Products sent that stock up to 16 1/2%, the highest ever recorded, but it fell back later to 16 1/4%, up 1/2% on the day.

Weekly mercantile reviews reported further irregularity in business. Some encouragement was derived by bull operators from the further improvement in the reserve ratios of the local federal reserve bank and the system as a whole, and the increase in car loadings for the first week in January over the week before.

Steel shares held relatively steady on reports that the Bethlehem corporation was planning to start four more furnaces and the publication of a preliminary hearing report of the Inland Steel company, showing earnings of over \$5,500,000 on the common stock in 1923, or more than \$4 a share. Announcement was made during the day that the United States Cast Iron Pipe company had ordered 60,000 tons of pig iron, stock of that company closing a point higher.

Strength of Pittsburgh and West Virginia was associated with reports of its possible requisition by New York Central, but these lacked official confirmation. Lehigh Valley was again active, the "rights" being admitted to trading on the New York curb and selling

between 33 and 29 1/2%. St. Paul issues yielded slightly on profit-taking.

Further reactions took place on the foreign exchanges, due to selling abroad, which apparently was inspired by political developments in Great Britain. Demand sterling dropped to \$4.23 and then rallied nearly a cent, while French francs were as low as 4.53 cents, and then snapped back several points. Local foreign exchange dealers reported that the buying of francs at the lower levels came from banks with French government connections.
