Corvallis Team Has Edge in Northern Section of Coast Conference

Oregon will manifest its grief at the passing of Woodrow Wilson today by a cessation of activities in all public offices, banks, schools etc., during the entire afternoon by proclamation of Governor Pierce. (The governor also issued a request to all schools of the state to hold memorial exercises in their respective buildings. The governor's proclamation follows:

Whereas, the funeral services for Woodrow Wilson are to be held at the national capital on the afternoon of Wednesday, February 6, 1924;

Whereas, memorial services at which the peoples of his country are to do our late president homage are to be held throughout the state of Oregon and the United States of America;

Whereas, Woodrow Wilson was our war president and one of the greatest Americans;

Now, therefore, I, Walter M. Pierce, governor of Oregon, do hereby proclaim the afternoon of Wednesday, February the sixth, 1924, a half holiday in order that the people of the state of Oregon may do honor to the memory of our fallen leader.

In witness whereof, I have here-to set my hand and caused the seal of the State of Oregon to be hereunto affixed.

Done at the capitol at Salem, Oregon, this 5th day of February, 1924.

The statement to the schools reads:

"While Wednesday afternoon, February 6, 1924, has been declared a legal half holiday in the state of Oregon, it is obviously impossible for all of the school children of the state to gain access to the public meetings that will be held in honor of the memory of America's great war president.

"It is, therefore, my earnest request that provisions be made for a fitting memorial service at the various public schools of the state where the school children may go to pay their last respects to the man who led our nation through the most perilous days of its existence."

Smoker Is Feature of

SILVERTON, Or., Feb. 5.—(Special to The Statesman.)—Delbert Reeves post No. 7, American legion, met for its regular meeting Monday night with an attendance of 125 members. Immediately after the meeting was called to order the post stood at attention with bowed heads for 30 seconds in honor of former President Wilson.

State Executive Committeeman Charles Johnson of the local post gave a talk on "The Compensation Bill and What It Means to the ex-Service Man." Mr. Johnson had just returned from a meeting of the state executive committee, held at Portland Saturday. The matter of the statewide essay contest was taken up and it was unanimously decided to put the matter before the schools. Dr. R. E. Kleinsorge and Louis Bock were appointed to take charge of this.

Following the business meeting the smoker took place. Martin Johnson met Seward Tegland, in a three-round boxing bout. Johnson was given the decision. The bout was a fight from start to finish. The second bout was between "Jingles" Warrensford and "Rip" Graham, weight 150 pounds, for a four-round bout. Graham was unable to answer the bell at the beginning of the third round and the decision was given Warrensford.

The main event of the evening was a three-round bout between Earl Bennett, 145 pounds, and Kenneth Benton, 155 pounds. This was a particularly fast bout and the boxers showed exceptionally good training and skill. This ended in a draw. The last bout of the evening was a wrestling bout between Harvey Wells of the legion and Jimmy Hollingworth, at 135 pounds each. It consisted of three 10-minute rounds. Hollingworth got the first fall in seven minutes and Wells got the second in four minutes. The last round was a draw.

It is as far as the state hospital for the insane is concerned, and Governor Pierce says he has heard hints that the farmers are finding the constant expense of gasoline machinery irksome and some of them are going back to steam.

The question came up at the board of control meeting Monday when Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner, superintendent of the state hospital, asked permission to buy a steam traction engine, declaring it would be good for 25 years, while the gasoline engines are good only for about five or six years, and are a constant expense because of repairs. The authority to buy the engine was granted.

Six Grade Crossings in
County are Slated to Go

The Marion county court has petitioned the public service commission for a hearing on the question of eliminating six grade crossings on the highway between Marion and Jefferson and the construction of one overhead crossing on that road.

A change in the location of the highway makes this possible, it is said, and the court believes the overhead crossing, which would be about midway between the two towns, would be of such benefit to the railroad company as well as to the public that the Southern Pacific company should pay a part to the cost of construction.
