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**Justice Coshow Files Candidacy for Nomination**— Justice O. P. Coshow of the state supreme court today filed with the secretary of state his declaration as a candidate for the democratic nomination in the primaries next May to succeed himself. He was appointed by Governor Pierce two months ago to succeed Justice L. T. Harris, who resigned, and under the law his successor is elected in the next election.

**Carl Pope Looked Upon As Certain Candidate**— Current rumors mentioning him as a possible candidate for district attorney are within the realm of possibility, it was admitted Wednesday by Carl T. Pope, attorney associated with Judge R. W. Marsters in general law practice.
