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STALLARD IS OUT FOR THE SENATE

Non-Partisan League Leader, Former Socialist, Runs as Republican

H. H. Stallard, Non-Partisan League leader, has made announcement that he is a candidate for the republican nomination for United States senator.

In his statement, now being circulated in the state, Mr. Stallard includes this bit of his political history:

"In 1914 I was nominated for congress by the socialist party of the seventh congressional district

of Oklahoma; J. V. McClintic (the present incumbent) by the democrats and J. T. Mills by the republicans. At that time the democrats had 15,500 votes; republicans 9,500 and socialists 6,400. When the smoke of battle cleared away in November McClintic had something over 11,000; I had over 9,000, and the republican had 6,000. I carried four of the largest counties. Mr. McClintic and I lived in Kiowa county—I carried it. We both lived in Snyder—I carried the town precincts and the county precincts lying adjacent to the town I carried by more than two to one."

Relative to his connection with the Non-Partisan league he says: "I have nothing to cover up and will not make any misrepresentations to get votes. I am a strong nonpartisan. I have for the Non-Partisan league cause suffered as others did during the war period all kinds of insults and abuses and by being thrown in jail without cause, but as Mrs. Skevington, the Irish patriot, once said: 'An Irishman that hadn't been in jail did not amount to much anyway.'"

"The Non-Partisan league is the biggest political factor for the betterment of the producers in the United States. The Pennsylvania Farm Journal says the league's tactics elected seven United States senators, Shilbest, Johnson, Ladd Frazier, Brookhart, Wheeler and Howell. Those are the senators who are standing by fighting Bob LaFollette. Does Oregon want to send another of this kind? I promise you that I will stand with these senators and if you will trace my record up you will find that those who know me best will tell you that when Stallard goes down you can depend on his face being towards the enemy."

BOY HAS SYMPTOMS OF CATTLE DISEASE

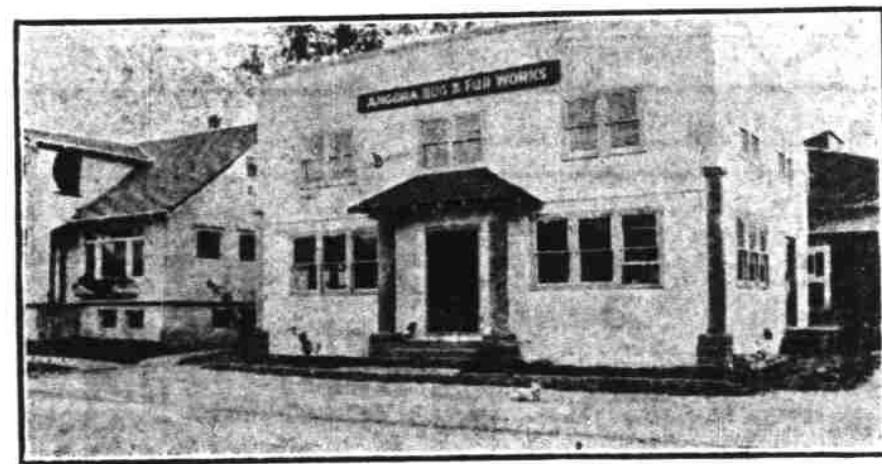
Hoof and Mouth Epidemic Thought to Be Complaint of Lad in San Pablo

OAKLAND, Cal., March 5.—Indications that a boy in the San Pablo region of Contra Costa county is suffering from foot and mouth disease, contracted presumably from infected cattle in that region, are being closely investigated by state, federal and local health authorities. It was announced today by Dr. C. K. Blake of Richmond, Contra Costa county health officers. The name of the boy is being withheld.

According to Blake the boy has all of the symptoms of the disease, but a few days must elapse before positive tests can be completed. The disease is rare among humans, he said.

SCARAMOUCHE MAKES HIT WITH CONVICT AUDIENCE TUESDAY

(By Jack Laird)

Through the courtesy of Arthur Hile, manager of the Oregon and Grand theaters, "Scaramouche," masterly 12-reel adaptation from Sabatini's novel of that name, was shown to an appreciative audience of prisoners at the state penitentiary on Tuesday night.

The play is historically illuminating of the period preceding the

French Revolution and ending with the climax of the Reign of Terror in '92, and through it runs a continuous thread of romantic interest. One's democratic sympathies are nearly enlisted by pictures of oppression, want and misery, contrasted with subtle glimpses of the vice and profligacy of the times reflected from the hectic life of Versailles.

In the character of "Aline," played by Alice Terry, is personified all of the dignity and feminine virtue characteristic of the old nobility before its decadence. Ramon Navarro as "Scaramouche," clown, patriot, loyal friend and lover, mounts dramatically from the ridiculous to the sublime. Lewis Stone played the part of "Marquis de la Tour," rouse, duellist, man of honor—personification in short of all the incongruous virtues of the period's dubious moral code. The characterizations of Marat, Danton, and Robespierre, the Lenin's of the French Terror, noisily pandering to the low and vicious impulses of the liberated mob, are peculiarly accurate.

In the mob scenes we are given a hint of the almost incredible frenzies of cruelty and bloodshed to which an oppressed people will attain when suddenly emancipated and when their passions of hatred are cunningly directed by masters of the blood-hypnosis, malignant experts in the psychol-

We feel very sorry that we are forced to win twice in order to win; and we are doubly sorry for those of the city council who were misled by the silence of those whose moral duty it was to inform them. Our only anxiety is that many of our voters may be misled. The question is of immense importance to every citizen of Silverton. No city can have a very great degree of prosperity and growth unless its public improvements are made without exploiting the one class for the benefit of a favored class. If we all lift a little together, as the proposed amendment provides, it will work a hardship on no one, and benefit every man, woman and child in our city, and Silverton will grow. On the other hand, if the matter of building such improvements as sewers is left open so that a few men can work against the interests of one class for the benefit of another class, our growth will be very slow, and those who stay here will be discontented and lack that patriotism that is absolutely necessary in order to secure to ourselves a stable government.

The election is declared to be illegal because the officers failed to put out pamphlets, as provided by our state law, to every voter in the city. But the amendment itself is perfectly legal, and if adopted, it will certainly give satisfaction as it does in Salem and in other cities wherever it has been thoroughly tested.
