
Water which has accumulated in the extreme lower recesses of the mine also has hindered the

work of rescuers. But three bodies were removed from the mine in the 12-hour period between 7 o'clock this morning and the same hour ton'ght.

Additional rescue crews from other coal camps in the region arrived this afternoon and immediately went into the mine. They will be used exclusively in fighting fires.

Seven bodies-the first to be interred here-were buried late today in the little cemetery which lies near the main entrance of the mine. The services were simple.
