The City Beautiful

THE CITY OF SALEM, OREGON, is located on the Willamette river about fifty-four miles south of Portland. It was founded by Jason Lee, a pioneer Methodist missionary. It was Lee's plan to use the site selected for a school for Indians and for whites. This school later developed into Willamette University.

Salem, as it stands today, is a city of approximately 22,000 people. It is the county seat of Marion county and the state capital, and, being the capital of the state, it is the center of practically all of the state's activities such as highway work, the state school for the deaf, blind, and feeble

minded, the insane asylum, penitentiary, asylum farm, penitentiary flax fields, tuberculosis hospital, boys' training school, girls' industrial school and the state irrigation work.

Salem also has the county work, the county court, etc.

Salem is 171 feet above sea level.

The assessed valuation of the city is \$11,784,225. This is rated on a 68 per cent valuation basis. There are four banks in Salem, whose total resources amount to \$10,074,671.98.

UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT

All petitions have been received and filed with the boundary boards of Marion and Clackamas counties for the formation of the Woodburn union high school district. It is reported that the county superintendent of Clackamas, who seems to be fighting this union, has refused to call an election in the joint district where Clackamas is concerned.

In some of the districts there is considerable opposition to this union, but it is thought a majority of the 19 districts favor such a union. Hubbard is divided on the question and the proposition has been made to levy 15 mills and add to the present building and conduct their own high school. It is thought that 8 districts are opposed and 11 are for the union. It is also rumored that peti-

tions are in circulation for other unions and possibly an effort will be made by Gervais and St. Paul to add to their unions more districts and more assessable property so as to be enabled to build. Under the new law it is easy work, as demonstrated by the Gervais union, to force other districts into unions.—Woodburn Independence.

FLOURING MILL CHANGES HANDS

For the first time since it was built by Chas. Scott, the flour mill at Scotts Mills has changed hands. The mill was built about thirty years ago and since that time has been run by its first owners, until it was sold last November.

Arthur L. Rich is the new owner. Mr. Rich contemplates the building of a new power plant, the preliminary work on which is al-

ready under way. The huge enclosure which is to harbor the water-power wheel is under construction now, one wall being already in place.

A new kilowatt dynamo is in place waiting to be driven by the water power of Butte Creek. When the electric equipment is installed the mill, which now has a capacity of 50 barrels per day, will be electrified. The power plant at the mill will also furnish light and power for the town of Scotts Mills. It is estimated that the electric equipment now being built will suffice for the town's use for a number of years to come. Mr. Rich is rushing the work so as to be ready for business as soon as possible.—Mt. Angel News.

LARGEST PAVING CONTRACT IN OREGON

Authorization of the calling for bids on a paving contract amounting to approximately \$100,000 and probably the largest municipal paving job to be undertaken in Oregon in 1924 will probably come before Dallas city council next Monday. The project came before the council Monday night at an adjourned meeting, but action was deferred to allow City Attorney Hayter time to pass on the legal-

ity of proposals which the council wished to include in its specifications. The project, as it now stands, will call for the construction of 78,633 square yards of paving in the city of Dallas. Of this amount 62,299 square yards will fall upon property owners, 14,503 upon the city street intersections and 1261 square yards will be against the Southern Pacific railroad. It is possible that the total may be cut down to allow the city to keep within its means in building intersections, and more may be added by petition of property owners in districts where cross streets are not on the paving program.

ALBANY PARK WELL PATRONIZED

ALBANY, Mar. 14.—Ten thousand persons from all states of the union and provinces of Canada visited the Bryant Park auto camp grounds during the five months from May to September inclusive, according to the report of A. H. Gillett, caretaker, just completed. The exact number was 10,368. Included in it are only those who remained for at least one night. Tourists who drove into the park for the day or any part of it were not required to register. There were 3182 cars registered during the five months.

Process of Roasting Gives Kick to Coffee and Cocoa

HAMBURG, Feb. 25.—(Mail.)—German and Swiss scientists who have been investigating the effect of coffee, tea and cocoa on the human system have reached the conclusion that coffee and cocoa are stimulating chiefly because of the chemical changes brought about by roasting. Experiments were made upon both men and dogs to discover the effects of the three drinks which are commonly used throughout the civilized world. These showed that tea was less exhilarating than coffee and cocoa.

Coffee from which the caffeine had been extracted also was tested, and men who had used this beverage without knowing the change made in it underwent the same stimulation enjoyed by those drinking ordinary coffee. They did not, however, have the increase in blood pressure which came to those who drank coffee from which the caffeine had not been extracted.

It was the conclusion of the investigators that the roasting of coffee and cocoa changes them in such a manner that when used in drinks they cause a secretion of acidity in the stomach which has a refreshing effect and increases the power for mental effort.
