Four Fatal Accidents—Four fatal accidents out of a total of 636 industrial casualties were reported to the state industrial accident commission for the week ending March 20. The fatal cases were: Antonio Drasche, Portland, offbearer; R. A. Kinsman, Carlton, logger; Harry Cole, Wendling, head rigger; Frank J. Hill, Astoria, high climber. Of the total number of accidents reported 542 were subject to the provisions of the workmen's compensation act, 91 were from firms and corporations that have rejected the act and three were from public utility corporations that are not subject to the act.

Fall, former Secretary of the Interior, had asked him to make a statement that he had loaned Fall \$100,000, and that he had consented in order to help the latter out of a difficult position. He said that he had not known at the time that the request was related in any way to the leasing by Fall of the naval oil reserves.
