SHANKS SPEAKS TO LIONS CLUB

Baptist Pastor Sees Good in Selfishness if Properly Regulated

"Selfishness becomes bad only when it interferes with the happiness and success of others, but the man who is not selfishly interested in his own affairs and life is worse than an infidel," declared Rev. E. E. Shanks, in speaking on "A Bull in a China Shop" at the Lions' club luncheon Friday noon.

Present conditions revealed in the United States congressional body were scored by Mr. Shanks, who said that the taxpayer is forced to "bear the burden in the end. The fact that the two leading political parties are nearly equal, making it possible for a small group of men to swing the balance of power, was held greatly responsible for the situation.

"While the American people are not interested, strife and contention enters and makes a sorry state of affairs," the speaker said. "Politics is a serious program and the laboring man, brought up to do hard work, has not thoroughly studied the situation and is unable to cope with the big affairs when planning laws."

The conference was highly interested in an announcement by Bishop S. P. Spreng of Naperville, Ill., who is presiding, that the church had been given donations to erect, equip and maintain hospitals under the direction of the general deacons board at Freeport, Ill., and Waterloo, Iowa.

Mr. J. Dale Taylor, accompanied by Miss Betty Bedford, was the soloist of the day. Frank Strube presided as chairman.

LOVELL ELECTED TO HIGH PLACE

Salem Minister Again Chosen Presiding Elder of Oregon Conference

PORTLAND, Or., April 4.—Upon the third ballot the Rev. G. L. Lovell was reelected a presiding elder in the Oregon conference of the Evangelical church by his brother ministers Thursday afternoon at the Evangelical conference in session here, to serve for four years. This is his second term.

Following the election the conference voted to station the Rev. Mr. Lovell on the Salem district and to restation the Rev. C. L. Schuster on the Portland-Puget sound district. No election was necessary on the northern district, as the term did not expire this year.

Most of the afternoon was consumed in examination of the standing and work during the past year of the individual clergymen, and especially as concerns the junior ministers. The report of the examining committee to be submitted later in the session will deal largely with the advisability of advancing the junior preachers.
