Salem Woman to Be Announced as Candidate for National Convention

Mrs. C. P. Bishop, a Salem woman, is shortly to be announced as a candidate for delegate at large to the Republican national convention.

Mrs. Bishop has resided for many years in Salem, where she is prominently identified in business, civic and social affairs. She is a member of the advisory board of the Oregon unit of the Coolidge Woman's club of America, and was the organizer of the Salem Woman's Republican club, of which she has been president for eight years. Also, Mrs. Bishop served on the Republican state central committee for two years.

and was chairman of the woman's division of the Marion county Republican central committee, and recently she took over the work of organizing a woman's Coolidge club at Salem.

In addition to her other civic activities, Mrs. Bishop is an active member of the Children's Farm home board.

At Campbell Court hotel Thursday, April 10, a luncheon will be given in honor of Mrs. Bishop by a number of prominent Portland club women, at which time her candidacy will be formally announced, and plans will be formulated to conduct an intensive statewide campaign in her behalf.

According to her friends, Mrs. Bishop has not personally sought election to the Republican national convention, but many prominent women of Portland and the state at large have induced her to become a candidate, and they have pledged her their general and united support. Mrs. Bishop is at present visiting in Pendleton, and she will return to Portland next week to attend the announcement luncheon in her honor, at which will be gathered not only her many Portland friends but a number of her neighbors from her Salem home.

MARION MAY BE JONES LOCATION

Some Doubt Exists Whether Man Fired Upon Was Escaped Convict

Warden A. M. Dalrymple sat in his office last night softly singing to himself the words of that famous strain "Where Is My Wandering Boy Tonight," as another day passed and Bert (Oregon) Jones, the last of the six convicts who escaped from the penitentiary a week ago Friday morning still evaded capture in spite of efforts of possemen to find and bring him back to the institution for a hair cut.

Through three special deputy sheriffs stationed at Green's bridge fired at a man they believed to be the missing convict about 3 o'clock Saturday morning, Warden Dalrymple said last night that he believed Jones to be in hiding in the vicinity of Marion, and as a result of his hunch there is no letup of vigilance around Marion and Jefferson and all bridges are still guarded while possemen are combing Linn county in the vicinity of Crabtree, Seilo, Lebanon, and Albany in Linn county.

The three guards told Deputy Warden J. W. Lillie, who rushed to the scene upon receiving the report that Jones had been fired upon, that they were sitting on the bridge when Clarence Boggie, of Lebanon, one of the trio, thought he heard a noise beneath him. Boggie said he flashed a light under the bridge saw a figure drop to the ground and dash for the brush, where he disappeared. A total of 16 shots were fired, it is said. The other guards were Howard Moore, of Salem and Clarence Fitzwater, also of Lebanon.

As Jones diet has consisted solely of a few eggs stolen from a nest Friday night, as far as the man hunters are able to ascertain, it is considered doubtful if he was capable of crawling along the girders beneath Green's bridge. His neighbors believe that since he is a good farmer; has made a success of his own business, and is a heavy taxpayer, and a progressive and far seeing man, he is the right kind of timber to help in handling the county's business. Hence their urgency that he become a candidate.

Mr. Palmer will no doubt stand on a platform for straight business and strict economy.

INDIAN BADLY HURT IN FIGHT

Irvin Tom Seriously Stabbed When Moonshine Is Drunk at Residence

Murder in the first degree is the charge that may be filed against Irvin Tom, an Indian now in the Polk county jail, as a result of a stabbing affray on the Grande Ronde reservation late Friday night which resulted in Clint Tom, about 30, being sent to the hospital in McMinnville with wounds from which he may not recover. "Firewater," which caused the original downfall of the red man, was the cause of the trouble. Joe Isaac, another Indian, is in jail for participating in the stabbing.

The three Indians had gathered at the home of Irvin Tom. Moonshine was imbibed and in the course of an argument concerning family property, a quarrel ensued which culminated in Irvin Tom drawing a hunting knife which he accused of plunging into the

body of his kinsman, the point of the knife entering just above the kidney. Should Clint Tom die Irvin Tom will be held responsible. It is not known here whether the case would be handled by the state or the government.

Irvin Tom was arrested by Constable Bonnick and taken before Justice of the Peace Anderson, where he waived his preliminary hearing and was held to the grand jury on a charge of assault with intent to kill. Isaac was arrested

near Tom's house, where he had assisted in carrying out the wounded man when he got into an altercation with a by-stander. He is serving out a \$150 fine in the Dallas jail as a result of the intoxicating liquor being present.
