

CITY NEWS IN BRIEF

Traffic Report Received—A total of 1823 traffic accidents was reported for the month of March by the state traffic department.

These were reported by state and county officers and by officers of the city of Portland. Persons injured numbered 223 and killed 7. Carelessness was held responsible for 1029 mishaps. Delinquent fees turned in by members of the department totaled \$7357.15 and fines imposed by courts amounted to \$3129.35.

Two Are Killed—During the week ending April 17 a total of 590 industrial accidents was reported to the state accident commission, of which two were fatal. The fatal cases were Morris Lockridge, Portland, electrician, and Alfred J. Hakura, Seaside, powder handler. Of the total number of accidents reported 615 were subject to the provisions of the workmen's compensation act, 73 were from firms and corporations that have not elected to come under the act and two were from public utility corporations not subject to the act.

Labor Conditions Better—Only 122 men registered for work at the United States employment bureau at the YMCA during the week ending April 19, according to the report of Sim Phillips. There were demands for 57, with this number referred. Fifty-one reported as placed. There were 33 seeking jobs as common labor, with 23 in demand and 21 referred. Of 31 woods laborers registering, only nine reported placed, with 11 in demand. Ten of the 18 farm hands who registered found work, with five of the 26 agricultural workers as fortunate, as there were calls for only six. Nine salespeople registered, with five in demand and placed. Four carpenters registered, with no demand. One pipe fitter registered and found work. Twenty-five women registered with nine in demand. Eight were placed. Agricultural laborers and domestics numbered 10 each, with five seeking work in the kitchen.
