Four Fatal Accidents— Four fatal accidents out of a total of 569 industrial mishaps were reported to the state industrial accident commission for the week ending April 24. The fatal cases were Fau Godfrey, Medford, lineman; William H. Owens of Reedsport, bucker; Joseph E. Worth, Portland, grain inspector; Lester W. Smith, Medford, swamper. Of the total number of accidents reported 480 were subject to the provisions of the workmen's compensation act, 87 were from firms and corporations that have not elected to come under the act, and two were from public utility corporations not subject to the act.

Banks Reject Savings Plan— None of the local banks were sufficiently interested in the educational thrift service outlined by H. L. Wilson, organizer, to warrant the installation of this service in the Salem schools.
