There is big money in the drug garden here. Our growers must learn it, and get into the game. A man with a vision, and with organizing ability, can do our section a world of good, in leading the development of this great industry.

Salem must have a peppermint oil refinery. That will keep the profits all here.

There was some injury, in some sections, from the frost of last week, to both cherries and prunes. Many orchards, however, escaped injury entirely.

In about two more weeks, gooseberries will come in; bringing \$300,000 to \$500,000 to Salem. Some of our folks laughed at the Stogan editor when, several years ago, he began boosting the gooseberry industry. They thought he was a raspberry, or a nut. Ask any gooseberry grower what he thinks now. This is the gooseberry center of the world, for quality berries.
