Church Members Discussed by Mrs. Barton in Interesting Manner

There is one great story of American life to be written, and it is surprising that so far writers appear to overlook the material.

Appropos of a flood of present-day novels, I can think of families that have died out within my lifetime, but I can not recollect one that has degenerated. These "average" people who I know are getting on; they are not slipping back. They are a long way from perfect, but they are not at the mercy of the subconscious.

From novels and reviews I would gather that churches are comically inadequate gestures, worn-out traditions now handed down by intellectual weaklings. Readers of our literature a hundred years from now can come to no other conclusion. Is that true?

Take Salem, where I have lived for ten years. Salem is a city of about twenty thousand people, and of this number I have a speaking acquaintance with six hundred or more. As I go over the list in my mind this way and that, at random, I can think of only one family who are not members of any church. They were Boston Unitarians and are among my dearest friends here, it happens.

Go into the canneries, mills, grange meetings, offices of professional men and women, stores, manufacturing plants, and there you see the same people that you see in the churches on Sunday.

I know many state officials, supreme court judges, city officials,

agreed that we are progressing. Why have we been unable to progress in our social lives as we have progressed in transportation? Peace, kindness, mutual help, fairness, politeness, pay larger dividends than flying machines or radios. Dr. Walsh has hit my conceit a hard blow, although I believe he has, for some purpose of his own, given modern man a little the worst of it.

German Triganist Preferred Jail to Any of His Wives

BERLIN, April 7 (by mail).—When Quentin Hardt, a shopkeeper, was sentenced recently to prison as a trigamist, his three wives arose from court room seats, cursed the judge and fought to get by the guards to their husband and comfort him.

At the time of his arrest Hardt had tired of all three wives, and informed the court that he preferred 20 years in jail to being compelled to return to any one of them. He was given a sentence of a year and a half and left the court in smiles. Hardt was born of German parents in Belgium. His first wife was a Russian, his second Polish, and his third a Rumanian.

Crows Kill and Eat a Hare
HAMBURG, Germany, April 7 (By mail).—A flock of crows attacked, killed and ate a hare near Tarp, according to observers who produced bits of fur and bone as proof. They say that the saw a single crow discover the hare in an open field.
