

MEDFORD, Or., May 5 .- Acting upon the supposition that the body of a unidentifed young man found Sunday in Rogue river may prove to be one of the D'Autremont brothers, sought throughout the country since last October in connection with the Siskiyou tunnel murders and train robbery, Daniel O'Connell, chief of special agents for the Southern Pacific railway today telegraphed
