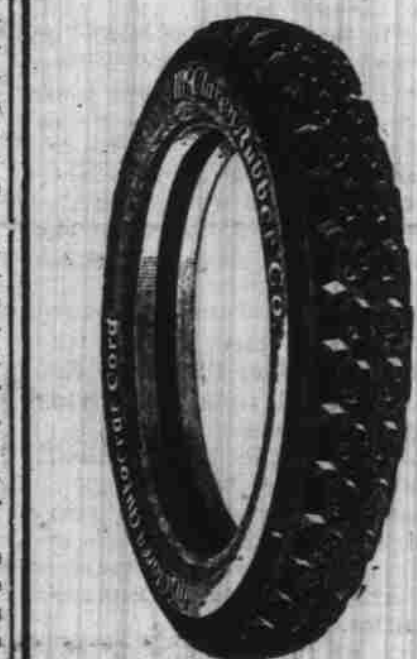
Three Tie in Guess On Time for Ice to Melt
