Title Completed— Attorney General Van Winkle has completed ballot title on the new income tax bill prepared by the state grange, and which has the approval of Governor Pierce, to be voted on at the November election. It increases exemptions to the level of the federal tax. The purpose as stated in the title is: "To provide for the imposition, collection and payment of an income tax on individuals, fiduciaries, corporations and persons; defining terms fixing penalties, prescribing powers of state tax commission and procedure in the administration of said act; repealing chapter 279, general laws of Oregon, 1923, known as the income tax act, and reimposing certain taxes based on net income received during said year 1923."

Must Hurry Returns— While the law allows the secretary of state 30 days after the primary election in which to make the official canvass of the vote in the presence of the governor and the state treasurer, Secretary of
