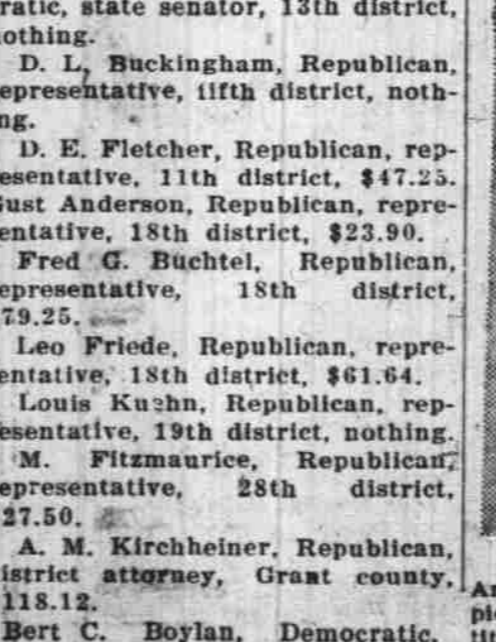
President Takes Gas Treatment for Cold

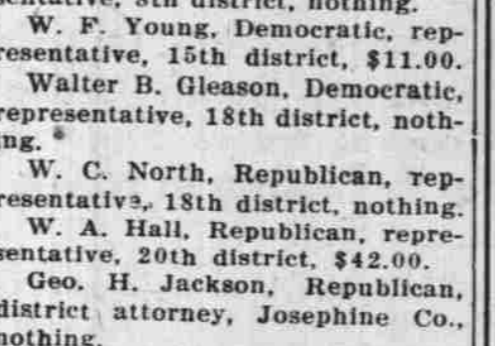
SQUAD OF CRIMSON MILERS PREPARING FOR BUSY OUTDOOR TRACK SEASON AT THE HARVARD STADIUM

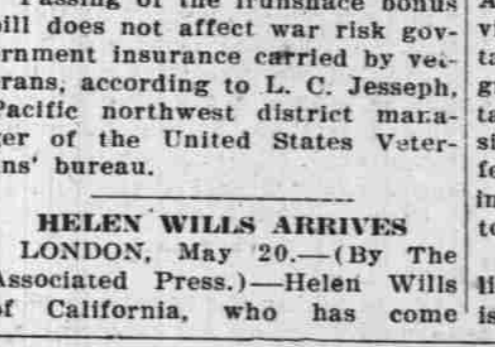
Tornado Hurls Garage 75 Yards Without Damage
