creased pay that is now given to employees who have been for a long time in service, and are entitled to some consideration on account of faithfulness.

It would discriminate in favor of the outsider coming in for short or "split" shifts; discriminate in favor of the stranger as against the rights of the home people.

It would not allow the restaurant proprietors to properly accommodate their customers at rush hours without adding costs that the business would not justify.

In short, the restaurant men argued that the conditions of the closed shop proposition are not good for a town like Salem, where business must be carried on to fit the conditions here, and not in some distant big city.

At the meeting last night there were bitter words over what some of the proprietors branded as misrepresentations (using a mild term) of the organizer coming in from the outside, who went about representing to each proprietor that some other proprietor, or all of them, were ready to sign up, had signed up, the closed shop agreement.

There was no disposition at the meeting last night to discriminate against members of the recently organized union.

But there will be no closed shop restaurants in Salem.

Paved road from Salem through Turner, Aumsville and to Sublimity; traveled road for two miles north of Sublimity, then east to Union hill, turning north and then swinging back toward the falls. This route will be plainly marked at all intersections and diverging roads.

With the drive taking but a little more than an hour, for it is only 26 miles to Silver Creek falls, an excellent Sunday afternoon drive is possible. Advantage may be taken of a loop trip of approximately 50 miles, by making the return from Silver Creek falls through Hault and Silverton, then by pavement again back to Salem.

The restaurants of Salem are to remain "open shop." What does open shop mean?

The burning of the flax refuse in boilers is not new, but it is a new thing in Oregon. It is done in other flax districts, but mostly the shives are used—that is, the parts of the straw that are left after scutching; that is, after the fiber is removed for spinning. At the Oregon penitentiary plant the chaff is now being burned, saving \$15 a day in fuel. Later, the chaff, mixed with the broken seeds, will be used for making cow feed for the dairymen.

In the mean time, however, the chaff would pile up if it were not burned, and make an extra expense in being hauled off and otherwise disposed of. When the shops inside the penitentiary wall are completed and running, the shives will be blown through a pipe to the boiler room. There will always be plenty of flax waste to keep the penitentiary boilers hot, forever and a day.

hours after death. Immediate burial is held a vital necessity.

While the government and state equally divides the indemnity after the animal or herd has been ordered killed, the great loss is the abandonment of the industry for at least three months due to the quarantine. Dairy cows average about \$100 each, while range animals are estimated lower. Rumors that ranchers had wilfully inoculated their herds with the expectation of being reimbursed were held by the speaker to be unfounded, for in many instances the appraisal was lower than the actual cost of the animal in Oregon, and no consideration is made for the loss of business.

Convict Develops Rare
Plant at State Prison

Through the efforts of Clarence Johnson, life term at the state prison, who has charge of the grounds surrounding the main building, a great variety of fine shrubs and plants have been transplanted this spring.

Of the many varieties, Johnson is particularly proud of his collection of African King, which has a highly perfumed leaf and a small white flower. This plant, according to Johnson, is used extensively in Greece for church decorations, and is seldom grown in this country. He believes the plants at the prison to be the only ones in Oregon. The seed was received packed in cotton, and then developed in the prison greenhouse.

Before landing in the penitentiary Johnson was at one time employed by a large California nursery and has had considerable experience with greenhouses, and through his acquaintance of former days he has been able to obtain many fine slips which he has developed and transplanted throughout the grounds.

The African King is planted in a small diamond-shaped plot between the fountain and the main entrance, where the concrete walk divides.

FRENCHMAN WILL
CONTINUE FLIGHT

SHANGHAI, May 21.—(By the AP).—Capt. Pelletier Doisy will continue his Paris to Tokio flight Sunday or Monday in a Chinese airplane, he announced this afternoon after he had made a test flight in the Chinese machine. The airplane was offered to Doisy by Gen. Ho Feng-Ling, military governor of Shanghai, after Doisy's own plane was wrecked when making a landing here.

Doisy's first stop on the continued flight will be Nanking.
