Eugene Widow Receives Insurance Money Check
Through the intervention of Will Moore, state insurance commissioner, Mrs. Belle Overton of Eugene has received a check for \$1000, payment in full on a policy carried by her late husband, James B. Overton in the National Life Insurance company of Chicago. When he took out the policy Overton was a railroad worker, the railroad company deducting premiums from the wages of its employes and paying the insurance company. Affidavits show that when Overton took the insurance he was told by the agent if he changed occupations, provided he did not enter a more hazardous occupation, before the payment of the first premium he quit the railroad and bought into a small sawmill. His wife paid the premium and it was accepted by the company. Soon afterward Overton was drowned and the company, it is said, declined to pay, whereupon his wife took the case up with the state department, and has now received payment in full.
