

> "Recently there has been started a movement, founded on sound principles, for the week those Christian ideals which should be dominant in the live, and characters of good citizens. The week day church school may be defined as a school organized group of churches, to which the pupils may go twice (once) each week for two (one) period a day, on school time. Since the school authorities in the district maintaining the church school are responsible for the children from the time they leave school until they return to their homes, the school boards must have some authority in determining the scope of the teaching, the preparation of the teacher, and the suitability of the equipment and of the classroom for instruction. A week day church school, therefore, should be defined by the department of education just as is a junior high school, a part-time or continuation school, or any other school which pupils may attend on public school


