A chafing dish is upset, and in a moment the whole place is a mass of flames. To insure realism, the cabaret set was built outside the studio and literally burned to the ground.

Arthur H. Sawyer, who supervised the film, engaged several members of the Alaska club, with headquarters in Los Angeles, to appear in support of Barbara La Marr, Lew Cody, Percy Marmont, Mae Busch, George Siegmann and others.

These men, familiarly known as "sourdoughs," spent several years in the Yukon country, and are thoroughly familiar with the atmosphere of Alaska. Their appearance in the scenes of the Malamute saloon, made famous by Robert W. Service's poem, has made a faithful reproduction of the period. Clarence Badger directed "The Shooting of Dan McGrew," while Winifred Dunn wrote the scenario.

NIFTY AUTO DRIVEN BY MR. HIGDON

Radio, Burglar Alarm, 24 Lamps, and Shocker for Meddlers Included

Eddie Orange Higdon, representing an undertakers supply company, breezed into the city yesterday with one of the trickiest automobiles to be seen here since the winter of the blue snow. If Higdon forgot anything in the way of a novelty it was because the object had not yet been manufactured.

Darkness has no fear for his machine was equipped with 24 lights with a total of 246 candle power. Two large batteries are necessary to supply the needed power for the equipment. Driving by himself is not lonely, for he has a federal 61 unit long distance radio. Protection for this and other equipment is given by a burglar alarm one of the features of the automobile. Touch the machine anywhere with more than the slightest pressure and a loud squaking horn begins to sound, continuing its bawling for two seconds. Another feature, not demonstrated, was the connecting with the batteries to provide a shock for the inquisitive meddler. "Strong enough," Higdon said, to knock a man down. His word was accepted as no one volunteered for the test.

Included in the other features and among the most prominent of the accessories were four air-meters, to gauge the pressure in the tires; two thermometers, a compass, automatic locks with secret combinations, altitude and grade meters and a barometer. Higdon's machine was a Packard roadster. During the last year he has driven it twice across the continent, entering 16 different states each time. He has maintained an average of 16 miles to the gallon of gasoline. The speedometer registered 34,214 miles to date.

Funeral of Student Is Held in College Chapel

The funeral of Earl Ramsey, Willamette university student who met his death while on a canoe trip on the river here Sunday, was held late yesterday afternoon in the chapel of the university. More than three hundred of his former class mates attended, while six members of his freshman class, fraternity brothers, acted as pallbearers.

Dr. J. D. McCormick of Kimball College of Theology had charge of the service. Prof. J. T. Matthews gave the funeral sermon. George Oliver, president of the YMCA,

and past president of the literary society of which Ramsey was a member, spoke briefly, telling of his earnest work on the campus. Music was furnished by an octette of university students.

Ramsey came to the university last fall, entering as a freshman. He became affiliated with the student YMCA and was a member of the Phi Kappa Pi fraternity and the Philodorian Literary society. He was quiet, interested in all the activities of student life, and an earnest student.

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Paul Costello, Winner Again After Two Years of World's Amateur Sculling Title, Beats Gilmore



After a lapse of two years, Costello, Olympic doubles champion with Jack Kelly, regained the Philadelphia gold challenge cup, emblematic of the world's amateur sculling championship. He defeated W. E. Garrett Gilmore, title-holder, by two and a half lengths of open water on the Schuylkill River. Costello overcame a lead of three lengths three-quarters of a mile from the finish of the mile and a quarter course, then pulled away from Gilmore to win comparatively fresh.
