California Girl Trims Best of British Men Players at Net Play

HARPENDEN, England, June 6.—(By Associated Press.)—Helen Wills, the California girl who holds the American women's tennis championship, today made a splendid impression before a large crowd of British tennis devotees in two exhibition sets with men as her opponents. One of them she defeated without once going up to the net—her favorite attacking point.

In the first set she triumphed 8-6 over S. H. Jarvis of the Harpenden club and later came within two points of making another victim out of D. M. Greig who ranks among the first dozen of the leading British players. Greig had to use all his favorite strokes and his strategy to turn back Miss Wills, who, at one time, had him trotting from one side of the court to the other. Finally, through the aid of some double faults by the California girl, Greig managed to get away with a victory, 9-7.

To those who ran over to congratulate Greig on "saving the honor of British tennis," Greig smilingly replied "you mean I really took a terrible beating."

By carrying Greig far into deuce games, it was morally a victory for Wills.

Favors a Gas Tax

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 6.—A gasoline tax of three cents per gallon was recommended in a resolution adopted by the Washington State grange in annual convention here today. The resolution suggested that half of the tax go to the state highway fund and the other half to the county in which the gasoline was sold.

A resolution denouncing the cigarette habit was adopted by the convention. It urged the grange stores to handle neither cigarettes nor cigarette papers.
