## THE CHAUTAUQUA IN THE OFFING

### The Campaign for the Season of This Year Will Soon Be Started Here

Salem Chautauqua, July 16 to 23.

The program, which is already in the hands of the local committee, fulfills every expectation of the Chautauqua boosters who predict best season in the Chautauqua history of Salem.

For nearly 10 years without a break Chautauqua has been a much appreciated annual attraction and 1924 finds the city more solidly behind it than any previous year.

Heretofore there had been some conscientious objectors to Sunday programs although these objecting graciously withheld active opposition and usually gave their personal support. In view of a growing opposition to Sunday programs, however, the management has finally been successful in eliminating them altogether, thus overcoming the last feeling of disagreement and also giving their own hard-worked performers and employees a much needed respite.

In order to bring these high class attractions at the very low prices secured through the purchase of a season ticket, it is required by the management that local citizens guarantee a certain minimum patronage each year. Thus it is through the willingness of this committee of local people to become responsible that the Chautauqua can be enjoyed by all at about one-fourth the cost of similar attractions under ordinary circumstances.

## ELLIOTT LEAVES FOR CONVENTION

### Resolutions Will Ask Kiwanians of Nation to Boost for Chemawa

N. D. Elliott, secretary of the Kiwanis club, leaves for Denver today to attend the international convention of the Kiwanis clubs. He will bear with him resolutions pertaining to the Salem Indian school, which will be offered at the big convention. The resolutions, prepared by a special committee of which T. M. Hicks is chairman, are as follows:

"Whereas, The Salem Indian school, located at Chemawa, Ore., and maintained for the purpose of educating the Indians of the Pacific northwest, now includes courses of study up to the 10th grade, and

"Whereas, Many of the government's wards are now seeking educational advantages at this institution to better equip themselves for their future duties of citizenship, and

"Whereas, These students are entitled to the same educational facilities and advantages offered the other citizens of this republic, and

"Whereas, The American Indian students at said school have repeatedly and undeniably demonstrated their native capacity to assimilate and profitably use instruction, and

"Whereas, Such instruction can be supplied by said school under the present congressional appropriation, and

"Whereas, The location and facilities of the said school are ideal for said purposes, and are available at a minimum of travel and other expenses to said Indians and the American public now, therefore, be it

"Resolved, That Kiwanis international in convention assembled and in conformity with our motto 'We Build,' declare that the course of study at the Salem Indian school should be extended to include the full high school course, adding to the present courses grades 11 and 12; be it further,

"Resolved, That it is the sense of this convention that Kiwanis devote its efforts to bringing about this result; be it further,

"Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be sent to the secretary of the interior."

**County Court Operating St. Paul Paving Plant**

Opening of the county paving plant at St. Paul Friday took the entire county court to that vicinity to witness the work. The plant, according to County Judge W. H. **NEED OF KIMBALL COLLEGE STRESSED**

Northwest Commission in Portland Endorses Local School and Head

A commission representing the Columbia River, Puget Sound and Oregon conferences of the Methodist church, which include the states of Oregon and Washington, met in First Church, Portland, Thursday afternoon, June 13th, to consider the present and future program of Kimball School of Theology.

After a thorough and sympathetic discussion of the needs of the school and the possibilities of the future, the following definite action was unanimously taken by the commission:

"We earnestly reaffirm our conviction of the need of a strong school of theology, missions, and religious education in the north-west. Kimball School of Theology at Salem should be strengthened and enlarged as rapidly as possible to cover this entire program and to meet the demands of the new day.

"For the adequate development of the school it is imperative that funds be provided for both endowment and building. We, therefore, earnestly request the annual conferences in the patronizing territory, which are represented in this commission, to authorize the administration of the school to engage in a quiet quest for \$250,000 during the present quadrennium. Of this amount seventy percent is to be used for endowment and thirty percent may be used for endowment or for building or equipment at the discretion of the board of trustees.

"To meet the current budget of the school and until such time as an adequate endowment may be secured, we request the annual conferences of the Portland area to authorize the raising of \$8000 for the year 1924-25; this amount to be distributed among the districts on the basis of church membership. Each district superintendent is to use his own method to collect the amount to be asked from the charges. It is urged that in each local church a Kimball Sunday be observed early in the conference year when the challenge of the ministry shall be presented to the young men and the financial and other needs of Kimball be brought to the attention of the congregation."

"We request each annual conference in session this fall to set aside a period early in the conference session to consider the recruiting and training of the ministry and the development of the program of Kimball School of Theology."

Great confidence was expressed by the commission in the development of the school under the leadership of President E. C. Hickman.
