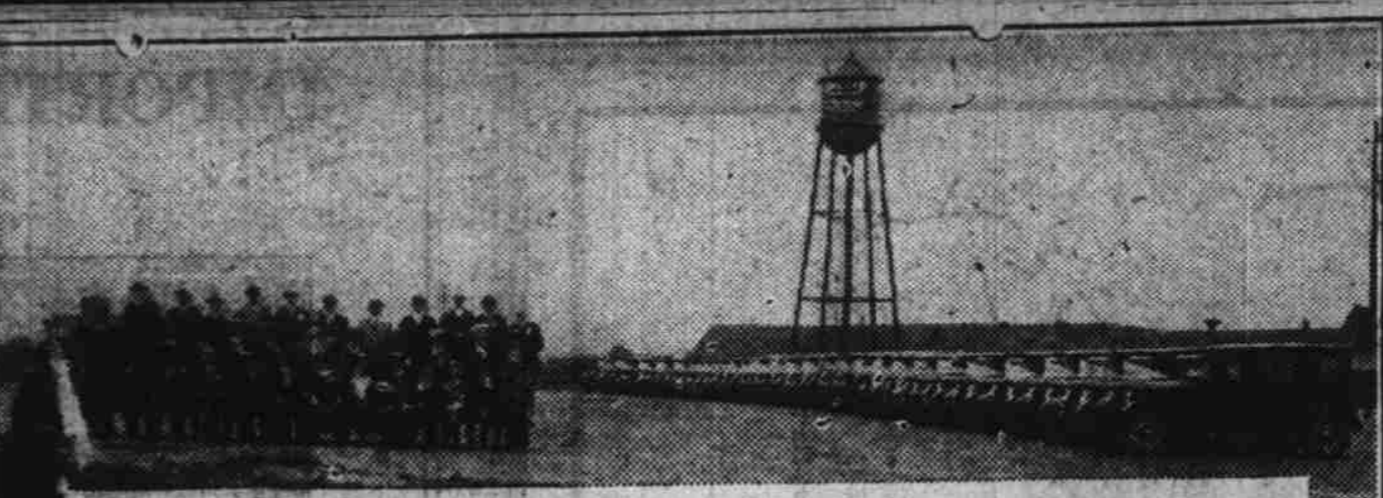

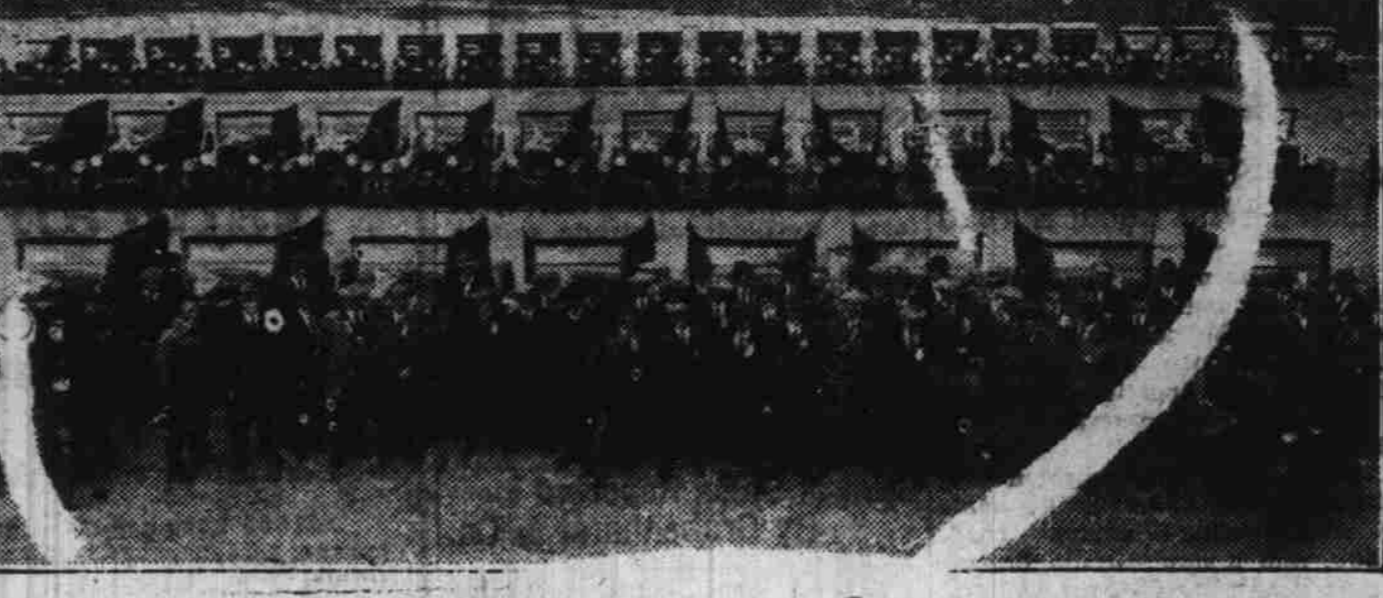

## CALIFORNIA SENDS MOST CARS HERE

Statistics in Kozer's Office Show Tourist Traffic in Oregon

California is sending more automobile tourists into Oregon than any other state, according to statistics in the office of Secretary of State Kozer. During the month of May a total of 7081 were registered in Oregon from other states, 3921 of them from California. Washington was second with 1795, and Idaho third with 558. The largest number of registrations was at the Ashland station where 1793 registered.

The non-resident registration law is mandatory, but many travelers seem to think it is discretionary and do not register. On the assumption that the number of persons to each car averages it is estimated that 50,000 tourists have entered the state so far this year. During the period between April 25 and May 31st \$3406 was received in motor vehicle license fees from cars which previously had been registered in other states.

The number of non-resident car registrations at the various stations in Oregon so far this year follows:
