SALEM WINS IN 10-INNING GAME

Eugene Club Gets Short End of 7-5 Score—New Pitchers Tried

It took a hard 10-inning battle for the Salem Senators to defeat the Eugene team on Oxford field Sunday, the game ending when Ashby knocked the ball over the fence in the last half of the 10th with two down, scoring Frisco Edwards ahead of him, and winning for Salem 7 to 5.

Biddy Bishop used three pitchers, while Frank Reinhardt, manager for Eugene, used Foster through the 10 grueling innings. Foster pitched consistent ball, but had a bad seventh inning when he allowed two hits, walked two batters and hit another. For Salem Bishop started a new pitcher, Springgate, who pitched four and two-thirds innings, allowing six hits, three of which were bunched in the fifth before he was relieved by Lund. At that Springgate looks good and doubtless will be used again. Lund pitched two innings and a third, allowing two hits, one of which was a homer by Foster. Lund's arm began to go bad, and in the eighth Ashby went in. He allowed two hits in that inning, but none in the next two, and struck out four men.

river. The trip was made from Bend to Eugene.
All the road will not be completed July 1, and it is probable that a detour of several hundred of feet will be necessary the remainder of the year. Mr. Chadwick said. At the point where the detour is necessary the road is being constructed through solid lava higher than the steam shovel that is employed on the work. Barring a hard winter, with deep snow in the mountains, it is expected the route will be open the entire year. The elevation at the highest point is just a mile.

Cherries Come Rapidly To Raas Warehouse Here

Judging from the number of growers in the vicinity of the warehouse on Ferry between Commercial and Front streets Monday, Claude McKinney, buyer for the Raas interests, was purchasing considerable quantities of cherries. Five cents a pound was being paid.

California, it is understood, has no fancy cherries this year and consequently has been forced to come to Oregon again for the fruit. So far this season all buyers have stood pat at the 5-cent a pound price, including the Raas interests.
Earlier in the season the Hunt Brothers Packing company sent out a feeler with an offer of four cents for cherries. The additional cent a pound was offered in general it is believed the price will remain at this figure.
