Spokane Men Enter Local Fruit Market This Week

Young & Wells, Spokane fruit dealers, will enter the Salem market today, offering 5 cents a pound for Bing and Lamberts, according to information received in the city Tuesday. Reports received were

to the effect that the firm would seek about 20 carloads of the black cherries from the Salem district. Mr. Young is expected to open headquarters at the old Salem Fruit union plant at Trade and High and is also expected to begin shipping the following day. Only fruit which has been sprayed for the cherry maggot will be accepted, according to local men who have been in touch with Young & Wells. It is expected that he will take all fruit offered which grades up to standard.

GAME FARM ADDED BY COMMISSION

Oregon to Have New Game Producer and Three New Fish Hatcheries

PENDLETON, Ore., June 17.—The Oregon state game commission meeting here yesterday authorized the construction of another state game farm and three additional hatcheries. According to Captain A. E. Burghoff, state game warden, the game farm will probably be placed in Umatilla county, while one of the hatcheries will be put in eastern Oregon, another in Tillamook county and a third in the Willamette valley. The addition of the three hatcheries will bring the number owned by the state up to 20.

The game farm will be modeled along the same plans that were followed in laying out the game farm at Eugene. Its capacity will be between 4000 and 4500 mature birds each year. Between six and seven acres will be under screen and the capacity of the farm will be about equally divided between the production of Chinese pheasants and Hungarian partridges.

The present season is proving to be one of the severest for game fish ever known in the state, Captain Burghoff declared. The drought has lowered the water in most streams and fish have been forced to congregate in the deeper pools, where they are easier to catch. Conditions have been very favorable for game birds, however, and it is expected that there will be more pheasants and other game birds this fall than ever before. A decision was also made by the commission today to enter into publication of an official magazine, which will be issued bi-monthly and will be edited by Otto M. Jones, in charge of education work for the commission.

WINNER IN BALLOON RACE UNDETERMINE

Lack of Reports From Contestants Cause of Little Official Knowledge

BRUSSELS, June 17.—(By the AP.)—The winner of the Gordon Bennett cup for 1924 has not yet been determined. The favorite in the great balloon race, Lieut. Ernest De Muyter, piloting the Belgica, has not yet been officially heard from. One report had it that he had been sighted over Ireland, which, if true, would give him the greatest distance.

De Muyter may still be in the air, but the other 16 contestants which took off from Solbosch plain Sunday have come to the earth again. Owing to the curious atmospheric conditions, the distances allotted to the aeronauts which comprise merely the distances between the starting point and the landing point in a straight line, will not be great, although the balloons in some instances traversed many miles in circuitous voyages. Some of them were becalmed for hours, while the sailing direction of others was completely reversed at times.

The greatest distance recorded tonight by the Aero club and that only an estimate, was allotted to the ville de Bordeaux, piloted by La Porto de France, 320 kilometers (about 215 miles); Captain Honeywell, commanding the Uncle Sam, covered, according to the same authority, 290 kilometers.

CHIVALRY COST BRENNAN LIFE

Famed Fighter Resents Abuse of Woman and Is Shot by Ruffian

NEW YORK, June 17.—William James (Bill) Brennan, the heavyweight pugilist, was slain in his uptown cabaret early Sunday because he resented abusive remarks made to a woman by Joseph Pioli, one of the two men held without bail today for the killing, according to Assistant District Attorney Morgan A. Jones.

The woman, whose name was not revealed, had gone to Brennan's cabaret with a party of which Pioli was a member, according to the prosecutor. As she was leaving with Pioli, he made abusive remarks to her. Brennan interceded, either pushing or hitting Pioli in jecting him from the cabaret, the prosecutor said.

"There are other ways of getting a guy than with your fists," Pioli is alleged to have said. "Look out for yourself." Pioli then left the cabaret, the prosecutor continued and later returned. When Brennan approached him in a hallway leading to the cabaret, a shot sounded and Brennan dropped to the floor. Four or five other men were in the hallway, Jones asserted, although it is not known whether they were companions of Pioli. The only other man arrested was Terence O'Neill, a pugilist, who was captured with Pioli soon after the shooting.

James Cullen, a state trooper and friend of Brennan also was mortally wounded when he tried to prevent the escape of the slayer. He died in a hospital today. Brennan's sister, a cabaret entertainer, known professionally as Shirley Sherman, was in the cafe when her brother was shot. O'Neill is a pugilist and Pioli is under indictment for the murder in March of his brother, Santo, the police said.

Maughan to Attempt Continent Flight in Day

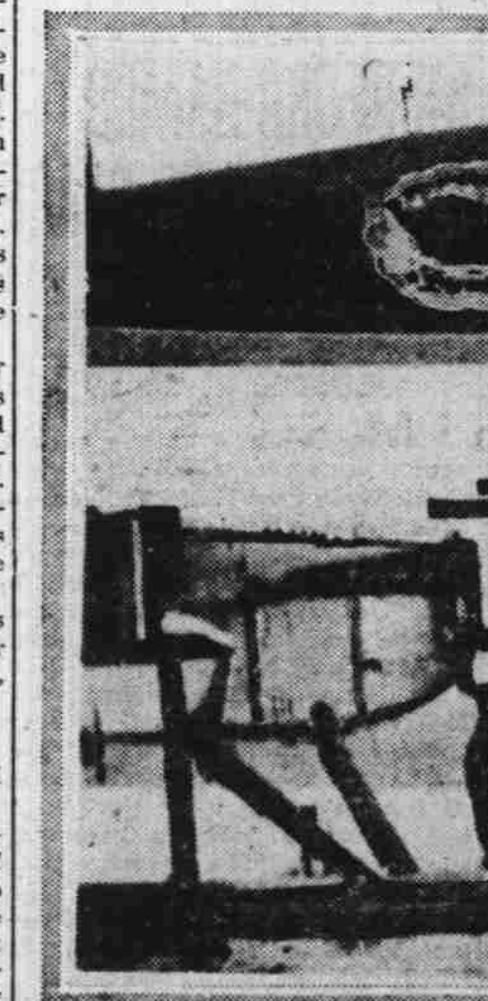
MINNEAPOLIS, N. Y., June 17.—Lieutenant Russell L. Maughan's attempt to cross the continent between dawn and dusk will be made Thursday if atmospheric conditions are favorable, according to the latest announcement made today, by starting at 2:22 a. m., eastern standard time, and flying at the rate of 160 miles an hour. Maughan hopes to reach the Pacific by dusk, or in approximately 17 hours. He attempted to make the same flight twice before, but was forced down each time without completing the trip. He will make four stops en route for gasoline.

Olympic Team Trains On Board the Ship

ON BOARD STEAMSHIP AMERICA, June 17.—(By wireless to the AP.)—An American Olympic team, taking advantage of excellent weather and a smooth ocean, got down to real training today with the athletes testing their sea legs in morning and afternoon workouts. There was a colorful scene of activity, the runners circling the promenade track, boxers and wrestlers at work in the rings, gymnasts performing, swimmers utilizing the special tank and oarsmen at the machines.

LOS ANGELES, June 17.—The police story of the shooting of Courtland S. Dines, Denver clubman, during a new year's party at his apartments here, was told today in the trial of Horace Greer, chauffeur charged with assault. Neither Mabel Normand nor Edna Purviance, motion picture actresses who were in the apartment at the time of the shooting were in court today.

A. W. Stoll, police detective was the principal witness. He testified of answering the call after Greer entered the central police station and announced that he had shot a man. Stoll went to the apartment and, finding the two actresses there, took them to the police station. Stoll was cross examined by S. S. Hahn, attorney for Greer.

"Now tell us, officer, were Mabel and Edna actually drunk when you entered the apartment?" Hahn asked.

The detective answered they had been drinking but were not intoxicated.

Col. Kelley Confers Regarding State Guard

SAN FRANCISCO, June 17.—Colonel John R. Kelly, assistant chief of staff of the ninth corps area, USA, left here tonight for a series of conferences with the governors of western states regarding plans for the national guard. His itinerary is as follows: Salem, June 19; Olympia, June 21; Helena, June 24; Boise, June 28; Salt Lake City, June 30. Colonel Kelly hopes also to visit various training camps while en route.

OFFICIALS TELL ABOUT DAUGHERTY

Former Associates in Department Warmly Defend Acts of Their Chief

WASHINGTON, June 17.—Four officials high in the service of the department of justice presented their side of controverted questions today in the senate Daugherty investigation. Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt, assistant attorney general in charge of prohibition enforcement, taking the lead.

In the course of a spirited and prolonged examination Mrs. Willebrandt defied her own and the department's administration, paid warm tribute to her former chief, Harry M. Daugherty, for "standing back of her when she got awfully hard pressed," and shared with the committee members about the disposition of congressmen to interfere in criminal prosecution and law enforcement matters.

John W. H. Crim, former assistant to Mr. Daugherty, in charge of criminal prosecutions; J. E. Hoover, acting chief of the bureau of investigation, and Charles A. Thomas, former Colorado senator and special war fraud prosecutor, were the others heard.

Walsh Is Boosted for Permanent Chairman

NEW YORK, June 17.—Sentiment in favor of the selection of Senator Thomas J. Walsh of Montana, leader in the oil lease investigation as permanent chairman of the national democratic convention was manifest tonight among the national committeemen and delegates who already have arrived here.

Almost without exception, the democratic leaders agree that their party should show its appreciation of the Montana senator's efforts by giving him special honors during the convention and at the same time capitalizing his nationally known connection with the oil investigation which they declare will be one of the outstanding issues of the campaign.

Government to Establish Coast Forest Station

WASHINGTON, June 17.—Establishment of a forest experiment station in the Pacific northwest to determine the proper methods of reforestation of the great forests of Washington and Oregon will be undertaken by the department of agriculture, secretary Wallace announced today, as soon as a location can be decided upon.

Funds for the work become available July 1. The two states together now contain 37 per cent of the total remaining saw timber of the United States exclusive of Alaska and their combined cut is about 30 per cent of the total cut of the country.
