Seattle Buyer Fails in Quest Here for Bings

A buyer from Seattle in this district in search of Bing cherries has found the valley virtually depleted of this variety, and, failing in his tour around Salem, he went on to Eugene in the hope of securing a carload from the associations there.

The Bing cherries of the Oregon Growers' association have been sold to Young & Weels, Spo-

kane buyers, who are operating in the Salem Fruit Union building. A price of 5 cents is being paid to most of the growers.

Reversing previous instructions, the association is urging all cherry growers to pick Royal Annes first instead of Bings in order to get them in out of the rain. Previous instructions had been to pick the Bings first. Growers report that the trees have been drying rapidly and that unless there are continued showers considerable dam-

age is not likely.

Word was received here yesterday that the Walker Canning company of Independence has purchased a 60-ton pool of cherries in the Dallas district, of which 40 tons are Royal Annes and the remainder Lamberts. Five cents is being paid for the Royal Annes and 4 cents for the Lamberts. This purchase will practically complete sale of cherries in the Dallas district, a number of lots of which have been sold to the Falls City

He said last night that we will likely have this year 10 to 15 per cent more hops than last year. The acreage has been increased, and there is more irrigation this year than last. The dry weather of the past few weeks has so far made no showing on the growing hops. They are looking fine, generally. But it may cut down the yield somewhat. But it has also prevented the working of vermin, which lowered the yield of last year.

Mr. Linn said the market is promising now. Contracts can be made at 20 cents a pound, but there is no demand at all for spot hops. And there is quite a tonnage yet unsold; more than was thought a few weeks back. Growers still holding for higher prices; though they could have closed out at a big profit a little while ago.

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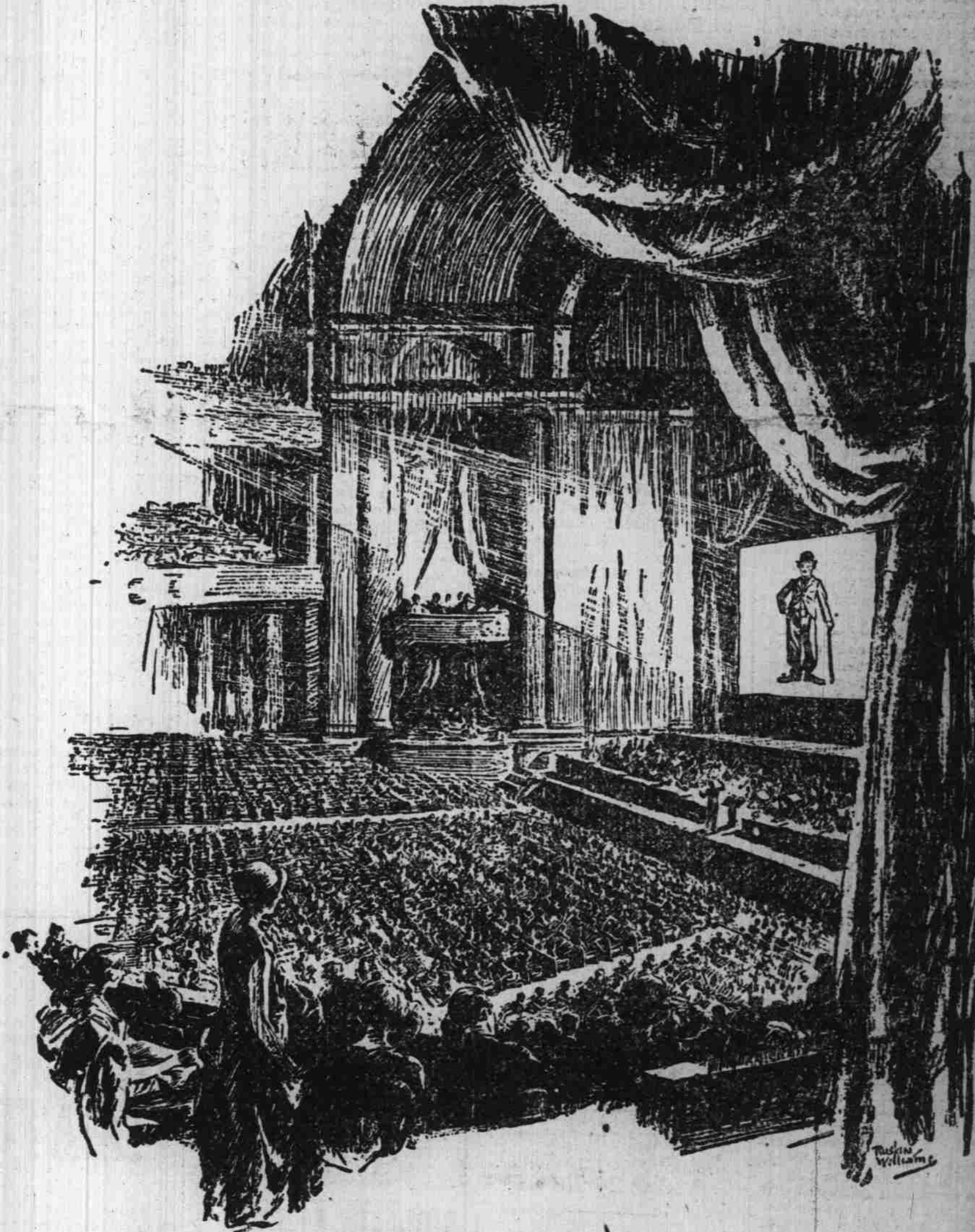
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
