LOCAL PARTY ENJOYS OUTING

Salem People Try Deep Sea Fishing Aboard Boat "Rainbow"

Walter F. Downing of Salem, returned home Thursday from his trip to Netarts as a guest of the trolling and deep sea fishing boat "Rainbow." The boat sailed from Portland, Saturday, June 14, with seven on board. T. J. Bligh, Elmer N. Downing, Walter F. Downing, T. J. Bligh, Captain Al Southmayde, also C. F. Hays and Ted Hays, of Portland former owners of the boat. The boat is now owned by E. J. Hadley of Happy Camp of Netarts, Oregon. E. N. Downing, Salem and Al Southmayde of Sheridan. We arrived at Ilwaco at 5 p. m. some trip down the Columbia. Mr. Bligh got cold feet and left us at Astoria. We left Ilwaco, Sunday at 5 p. m., and visited the light house before crossing the bar. Same view we had from there. We crossed over the bar in fine shape and found the sea a little rough but everything went all right. We saw a wonderful sight near the bar at Netarts. Sea Lion Rocks and there must be 500 sea lions on the rocks. They went in the water when we passed. Large ones, also thousands of birds to be seen on the rocks. We crossed over the bar in fine shape Sunday 1:30 p. m. A large crowd was on the beach to meet us. We cast anchor and went ashore to our camp. Monday we kept quiet and let the boat rest.

Tuesday, 17, we went deep sea fishing with 16 passengers, crossed over the bar in fine shape and a fine trip, out about two hours. On Wednesday six of us had a great trip. On crossing the bar we got wet from the waves.

We went down the coast past Cape Lookout. A great sight we saw there. We caught 30 red snappers, one salmon but it commenced raining and we headed for camp. On crossing the bar we got a wallop again, the boat never performed better. We arrived in Astoria and three days the camera was big feed of fish.

We also had a big feed of crabs and mayonnaise dressing which was sure fine. We also had another big feed of clams.

I was sure well pleased the way the boat performed and will be ready when I can for some more trips on the wonderful boat, Rainbow. The boat will remain in Netarts bay to carry passengers out for deep sea fishing. I came home by stage from Netarts, Tillamook to McMinnville, transferred to Salem stage and arrived home feeling fine.

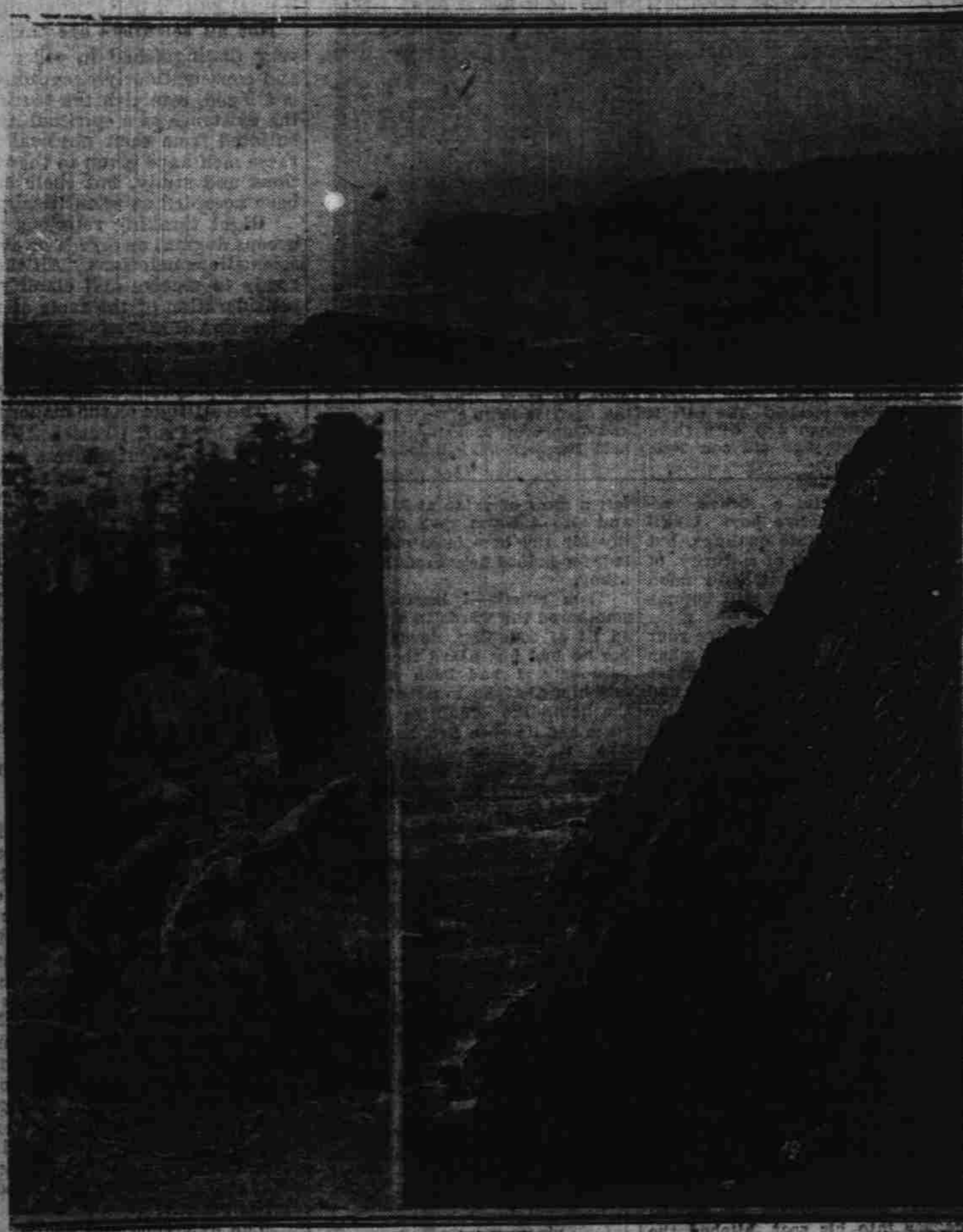
LAPPS TO HAVE VISITORS
